# ABLY REFUTED.

Hon. B. H. Roberts Replies to Arraignment of Mormonism By Ex-Senator.

THANKED GOD FOR THE "EX."

The Church Put in a False Light by Its Enemies - The Mormons Have Not Broken Faith.

Provo, Utah Co., March 15 .- An audience of about 2,500 people listened to an able address by Hon. B. H. Roberts in the stake tabernacle, last evening, in reply to the charges made by Senator Kearns against the "Mormon" people in his speech in the United States senate. The utmost attention was paid the speaker for two hours, and only the force of habit, which is against applause in the tabernacle, prevented vigorous manifestations of approval of the strong points presented by the speaker in refutation of Senator Kearns' charges against the people. This was overcome once, however, when Mr. Roberts used the expression, "Thank God for the ex," in speaking of the ex-senator. A full report of the speech was taken and will appear in the "News."

Mr. Roberts referred to the speech Mr. Roberts referred to the speech of Senator Kearns as an attack upon the "Mormon" Church and against the best interests of the people of the State of Utah, cunningly planned and adroitly executed, and one that, with the prestige of a United States senator behind it, would be misleading to people not acquainted with conditions in Utah; and our own people at least, should be put upon their guard against the mischief it intended. Regrets were expressed that the speech was not answered upon the floor of the senate. There might/be reasons of prudence and the advise of friends which had prevented the gentleman, whose duty prevented the gentleman, whose duty it was to reply; it might be that he could not answer it in the manner he desired without some preparation, but ten minutes out some preparation, but ten minutes in refutation of its falsehoods, at the time could have been more effective than anything that could be said now or that can be said on the floor of the senate hereafter. All that could be done now was to point out to the youth the uniruthfulness of the charges and disclose the sophistry upon which they are based. He absolved Senator Kearns from any responsibility for the production of the speech. The duliness of his mind and the density of his ignorance prevented him from furnishing so able a production in so bad a cause. He was only the author of the speech in the serse that he had purchased it and adopted it. While no name was mentioner, sarcastic reference to the changeable political course of a certain Utah politician and the ability of such a man to produce the speech, were made

in such a way that it was plainly un-derstood that the speaker considered ex-Senator Cannon the author of the speech.
Mr. Roberts took up the charges Mr. Roberts took up the charges against the "Mormon" people contained in the speech, one by one, and refuted them commencing with the charge of breaking the pledge in which statehood was obtained. This was disposed of by reading from the enabling act:

"That perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and that no inhabitant of said state shall ever be molested in person or property on ac-

molested in person or property on ac-count of his or her mode of religious worship, provided that polygamous or plural marriages are forever prohibited," which was incorporated in the Constitution of the state. And further to make the declaration operative the following was made a part of the Constitution

stitution:

'The act of the governor and Legislative assembly of the territory of Utah, entitled, an act to punish polygamy and other kindred offenses, approved Feb. 4, A. D. 1892, in so far as the same defines and imposes penalties for polygamy, is hereby declared to be in force in the state of Utah.

The provisions of the territorial law against unlawful cohabitation were not made a part of the Constitution, because the demand of the people of the United States did not require it. This question was quite fully discussed, and

question was quite fully discussed, and excerpts from the debate in the constitutional convention were read in sup-port of Mr. Roberts' position. The present state law against unlaw-The present state law against unlaw-ful cohabitation was made a part of the statutes by the Legislature, and while the speaker did not justify anyone in violating the law, he objected to all the people being blamed for such violation. Those who violated the law were liable to the consequences; if their neighbors who were acquaint-ed with the conditions believed it best for the state to rigidly enforce it.

Smith for his re-election, and was met with the reply "we are not in politics," And also that the anti-Church position of the Tribune was for the purpose of frightening the Church leaders into giving their support to Senator Kearns for his re-election, but "thank God he found men who could not be frightened whatever else may come." Senator Kearns did not discover the inequity of Church influence, by which he admitted he was slected, till he found it could not again be obtained.

The claim by Senator Kearns ef attempts at financial monopoly on the part of the Church was denied and disproved, and the desire on the part of the "Mormons" might live together in unity and work together in harmony for the upbuilding of the state was carnestly and elequently proclaimed at the close of the address.
