Believes Present Method of Government Control Will be Very Expensive.

ONE MAN SHOULD CONTROL.

or the Work Should be Let to One Large Contracting Concern.

New York, Feb. 25 .- John F. Wallace, formerly chief engineer of the Panama canal, has contributed an article to the March number of the Engineering Magazine recounting his observations and experiences during the year in which he was in charge of the construction work in the canal zone. In this article Mr. Wallace declares it to be his belief that "it will require more time and money to construct a high level canal on the 85 foot plan, under the present method of government control, than it will to construct a sea level canal, provided the work is accomplished by modern efficient meth-

He advocates either placing the work in the hands of one man-practical en-gineer-with untimited authority, or letting the work to one large contract-

article says, in part: "Of the factors which exercise the greatest deterrent influence in the accomplishment of satisfactory results under direct government control, the first is found in the laws governing the disbursement of public funds. The

the disbursement of public funds. The official and the commercial ideals are evidently diametrically opposed.
"In modern ordinary affairs the principle of adut before payment is adopted; the government audit system, on the contrary, is based upon the principle or audit after payment.
"It should be apparent to every thinking man that when work must be conducted 2,000 miles away from the seat of government a policy imposing

seat of government a policy imposing the necessity of referring all import-ant questions to Washington and submitting them there to men who neces-sarily cannot be conversant with the conditions on the isthmus unless they are informed by the parties on the ground, cannot give satisfactory re-suits, no matter how honest or efficient the supervising officials may be. I may perhaps feel too strongly on this may permaps leef too strongly on this point, but my experience at Panama, my occasional contact with governmental methods, reaching back to a service of five years as assistant engineer on river and harbor improvegineer on river and harbor improve-ments, has convinced me that attempts to carry on constructive work under the direction of Washington bureaus, especially when the work is large, com-pilcated and distant from the seat of government, are conducive of extrav-agance and waste as to both time and money. I am emphatically of the opinion that governmental functions on the isthmus should be confined exclus-ively to a general supervision of the ively to a general supervision of the work and enforcement of such simple ordinances and sanitary regulations as may be necessary to secure the peace and the health of the community af-

fected by the constructive work.

"The question of control of the commissary, the rate of wages paid by the sub-contractors and a host of other defor a single contracting organization to control the entire work. Either the work should be put into the hands of one strong man, with practically un-limited authority, combining the tech-nical and scientific training of the ennical and scientific training of the en-gineer with the administrative and ex-ecutive ability of a man of force; with this should be coupled the separation of all matters connected with this work from the control of the ordinary gov-ernment departments at Washington-but under such supervision only as to insure the government that his admin-istration is efficient, or the same reistration is efficient, or the same re-sult should be accomplished through letting of the work to a contracting firm large enough to control under one management the entire constructive work on the isthmus, under broad and general specifications and under such

general supervision as may appear to Congress to be proper." In conclusion, the article says: "If the experience had not been so serious, I should look back to my first connection with this enterprise and the experience gained therewith, and smile to think I had been so innocent as to suppose myself able to overcome the long settled influences heretofore indi-

Addington and Chief of Police Hyatt that he had murdered his wife, Elizabeth Wilber-Camp-Hammond on Nov. 12, and placed her body. mond, on Nov. 12, and placed her body in a trunk in their home on South Ferry street, where, partly decompos-ed, it was found by the police two weeks later.

Since the discovery of the crime and Hammond's subsequent flight, circulars containing a description of him have been scattered throughout the country, but in his confession Hammond says he has been in Albany since early Friday night.

As Hammond was plentifully supplied with money when he left here and as all trace of him had been lost in Helena, Mont, where his cousin, Arthur Strong, who accompanied him on his flight, deserted him on Thanksgiving day, the police of this city had practically abandoned the search and expressed the belief that he had left expressed the belief that he had left the country. GREAT TIDAL WAVE

FOLLOWS EARTHQUAKE.

New York, Feb. 26.-A cable dispatch to the Herald, dated Buena Ventura, Colombia, says: An earthquake occurred at 25 min-utes to 11 on the morning of the 21st

lasting about seven minutes, the move-ment being from the north to the The town was considerably shaken p. The damage, however, was small, but the people were thrown into a panic, kneeling, weeping and praying in the streets. All the clocks in the town were stopped, while the cables were broken in many places.

Following the earthquake, there was a tidal wave which was of no conse-quence here, but the reports from the coast, including an area of 50 leagues to the south, state that 2,000 were killed by falling houses or drowned by the wave, whole families having been jost. Sailing vessels report having encountered hundreds of corpses and quanti-ties of dead fish, and many small set-

tlements were completely swept away.

The damage done by the earthquake and tidal wave at Tumaco was greater than there, and a few lives were lost. The shock was felt in the interior and five people were killed at Tuquerresin. At Popayan the people resorted to tents, and thanksgiving services were held on Feb. 21 and 22. Twelve dis-tinct shocks were felt, but it is believed that all danger is over now

KAISER WILHELM'S SILVER WEDDING.

Their Majesties Received Deputations From the Reichstag. Diet and Lords.

TENDERED CONGRATULATIONS

Will Receive no Presents From Their Subjects Except for Charitable Purposes.

Berlin, Feb. 25 .- Emperor William and Empress Augusta Victoria received deputations from the releastag. the Prussian liet, the Prussian house of lords and other governmental bodies at the palace today, who tendered congratulations on the silver wedding anniversary of their majesties, which is next Tuesday. Deputies from many German cities also presented written addresses. The mayor of Berlin banded the emperor a document hearing the names of the emperor and empress and showing an expenditure of \$125,000 for charitable in /itutions.

Their majesties, according to the resolutions announced months age, will not receive presents from their subjects excent the more for charitable and their subjects excent the more for charitable and the charitable excent the more for the charitable excent the charitable e

subjects except the money for charit able uses which many municipalities and numerous mercantile companies and private individuals have voted or donated, out of respect for the emperor and empress, for hospital extensions or for founding new institutions, for the relief of suffering, estimated at \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 Such an outpouring of donations is quite without precedent in Germany About 100 annexes or new foundation will be dedicated in Prussia Tuesda all receiving the names of the empera or of the empress.

A brilliant display was made by the deputations of military officers from Great Britain, Russia, Austria and other powers as they drove down Unter den Linden to present their congratu-

The emperor also received a deputa-tion from the United German Veteran Societies of North America, consisting of soldiers who fought in the wars with Denmark, Austria and France. The veterans were introduced by Vice Admiral Bucchgel, chief of the admir dity, who is an honorary member of the societies. This deputation presented the emperor and empress with huge bowl resting on an onyx column, the whole about five feet in height. Three buffalo heads, surmounted by bronze figures of Indians, are on the base of the cup, which is also decorated with bows and arrows.

The bowl contains also portraits of Emperor William and President Rooseve and designs symbolical of German and American relations.

The wedding of Prince Eitel-Fritz, second son of Emperor William, and the Duchess Sophie Charlotte of Oldenberg on Tuesday will almost be a replica of that of the crown prince and crown princess last June. The Duchess Sophie as part of the pageant will enter Berlin tomorrow evening, proceeding through a flower and banner bedecked way to the castle where the decked way to the castle where the emperor, surrounded by his family and numerous German princes, will

The grandmother of the duchess The grandmother of the duchess Princess Friedrich Karl of Prussia, will drive with her in the entry into Berlin instead of the empress, who is indisposed. The hotels are already filled with members of the minor German ed with members of the minor German royal families, of whom on these occa-sions the capital usually sees from 50 to 100. They and their gorgeous suites filled up the boxes at the gala suites filled up the boxes at the gala opera performance on Saturday night, occupied the principal places at the banquet in the great white hall of the castle this evening, and will form a rich setting of costumes and uniforms for the wedding ceremonies, of which there will be three, the signing of the marriage contract under the statutes of the house of Hohenzollern tomorrow, the administering of the civil law service on Tuesday and an hour later, the religious rites in the hour later, the religious rites in the chapel of the castle by Dr. Dryander, the court chaplain.

KILLED HER UNCLE.

Italian Girl Says He Took Advantage Of Her Innocence.

New York, Feb. 24.—Mrs. Josephina Terranova, a 17-year-old Italian giri, confessed today that she killed her un-cle, Gaetano Riggio, and attempted to kill his wife, and declared that she was

kill his wife, and declared that she was justified in doing so.

When arrested she told the police that her uncle had taken advantage of her innocence when she was a child, with his wife's knowledge, and had so mistreated her that on the day of her wedding, two months ago, her young husband left her.

Suffering from the jeers of her friends, she said she put on all her wedding finery, went to her uncle's room, and after hring two shots from a revolver at him and missing, fatally stabbed him and wounded her aunt. She escaped arrest until today, when She escaped arrest until today, when she was found by the police a few hours after her uncle died at his house. She had been riding about in the street cars since Thursday night, almost without food or sleep.

EX-SPEAKER DAVID B. HENDERSON DEAD.

Dubuque, Ia., Feb. 25.—Former Speak-er David B. Henderson of the national house of representatives died at 2 house of representatives died at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Mercy hospital of paresis, which attacked him nine months ago. He began to sink Friday afternoon, railied Saturday morning, but in the morning lapsed into unconsciousness and failed rapidly until the end came. All his family except a son in California, were at the hedstde.

bedside. Col. Henderson had been unable to Col. Henderson had been unable to recognize anyone but his wife since a week ago, except on Friday, when he partly regained his mental faculties. Col. Henderson was stricken with paresis last May, and his condition grew so grave that he was removed to a hospital in September. His condition remained unchanged except for the usual progress of such a disease till a usual progress of such a disease till a week ago last Friday, when he suffered another stroke, which resulted in total

The former speaker falled rapidly, physically and mentally, until Friday, when his mental powers returned for a few hours, followed by a relapse, which ended in death. The funeral will be held next Thursday, with services in the Episcopal church under the auspices of the Grand Army. Former Congressman George D. Perkins of Sloux City will deliver a eulogy. The body is to lie in state on Thursday at the church.


