Internal Revonue Collector Callister states that there are a number of liquor dealers who have failed to pay their special tax to the government, which was due at the close of the fiscal year, on June 30. The dealers have the

month of July in which to pay the tax before any penalty is imposed. If they fail to settle on or before Aug. I, they must pay a penalty of 50 per cent of the amount of the tax.

New Company Gets Franchise to Oper-

ate Electric Transmission System.

The Salt Lake county commissioners, at a meeting yesterday afternoon, granted to Emil J. Raddatz a franchise to build and operate an electric transmission system from Big and Little Cottonwood canyons to Bingham June.

Contenwood canyons to Bingham Junc-tion and Sandy, the line to be com-pleted by next January, and the cost of the construction to be half a million. Mr. Raddatz promises to furnish the county, gratis, a continuous service of lights, not to exceed 50 32-candia power lamps, and the county will have the right to string wires on the company's poles free of charge, the location of the poles to be decided by the commission-ors.
