

**THE SERVANT  
IN THE HOUSE**

Mary Growan of New Brunswick,  
N. J., Has Been Fifty Years  
In One Family.

A HUNDRED DOLLARS A YEAR.

Got That at First and Has Never Had  
A Raise—Has Never Had a Vacan-  
tion and Very Few Days Off.

New Brunswick, N. J., April 3.—Mary  
Growan resumed her duties as cook to-  
day. Yesterday she was the honored  
guest of the family of Abiel Price of  
Salt Lake. The occasion was the fiftieth  
anniversary of her employment, which in  
this day of household complexities and  
servant problems is a record of fidelity  
that the Prices made the day one of  
grateful celebration.

Friends of Mary Growan and friends  
of the Prices came from far and near.  
The house was beautifully decorated  
and the river-side orchestra of the  
village made music while gifts and  
praises were showered upon the old  
cook. From 8 and 7 o'clock a banquet  
was served, and Mary, with eyes  
dimmed with tears of joy, sat beside  
Mr. Price. Members of the family  
vied with each other in paying her  
compliments and everybody made it a  
point to bestow something of the  
many delicacies which loaded the  
table. A cake adorned with 50 candles  
and supporting two small Irish flags,  
glittered in the center of the board.  
While hanging on the wall were old  
diagrams and framed pictures that  
Mary had used in days gone by.

Mary Growan came to the Price fam-  
ily on April 3, 1859, and asked for \$100  
a year as wages. She entered the  
household under these terms and has  
never had a raise nor a vacation since,  
and but very few days off. She has  
never visited New York since the Civil  
war. Although 82 years old, Mary is  
still in good health and is still the cook  
with the Prices who, however, con-  
sider her one of the family and dearer  
than most relatives.

**FORT STEVENS.**

Report That Portions of It Are Sink-  
ing Will Not Down.

Portland, Or., April 3.—The Oregonian  
today says that notwithstanding the  
reports that have been made regarding  
the sinking of portions of Fort Stevens,  
the report will not down.

Saturday that only one of the batteries  
had sunk a few inches, another is that  
the sinking is much more general than  
at first stated and that it prevails  
throughout the whole peninsula. Also  
this latter report has it that some of  
the heavier buildings are settling to  
such an extent that cracks are forming  
in the masonry and foundations.

It is alleged that in the vicinity of  
Fossil, the Astoria & Columbia River  
railroad, has been compelled to raise  
its grade in order to be above high-  
water; that it has been necessary to  
place in position on the left a greater  
amount of material than called for in  
the engineer's specifications; that at  
Warrenton it has been necessary to in-  
crease the height of the dikes to pre-  
vent inundation, and that the proposed  
control tower has been delayed in  
construction to permit more exact in-

says:

"A bombshell that will shatter all the  
financial hopes of Count Boni de Cas-  
tellane is contained in the news that  
the Princess de Sagan expects the ar-  
rival of a new heir to the Sicilian  
duchy and the Count's millions some time  
in June or July. The arrival of the D.  
Sagan heir will give Anna Gould the  
white hand over Boni.

"By her father's will the princess is

child or children she may have. This  
places her in the position of being able  
to hold Boni's children's future inheri-  
tance and vulture over his head to whip  
him into a less warlike frame of mind

the coming heir of the De Sagan."

**NEW ITALIAN  
PARLIAMENT**

Will be Large Ministerial Major-  
ity Although Socialists and Re-  
publicans Have Gained.

**ROME RETURNS A SOCIALIST.**

First Time It Was Ever Done—Priests  
And Members of Religious Orders  
Took Active Part in Campaign.

Rome, April 4.—It is now possible to  
form a good idea of the character of  
the new parliament. In a word, the  
twenty-third Italian program legis-  
lature will closely resemble its prede-  
cessor. There will again be a large  
ministerial majority, although the So-  
cialists and the Republicans have  
gained a few seats, which will in the  
new house, increase their small parties  
of 25 and 29, respectively, in the last  
chamber. By far the most notable  
Socialist victory has been that of Sig-  
nor Bonasconi, in the second division  
of Rome, the largest, wealthiest and  
most aristocratic part of the Italian  
capital. One of the curious features  
of the polling in that division was the  
fact that the clergymen and the other  
servants of the quincunx, which is in  
the constituency, all voted completely  
for the Socialist against Signor San-  
tini, who had the support of the vati-  
can and is a special favorite of Queen  
Margherita. This is the first time that  
a Socialist has ever been elected for  
any division of Rome.

It was noticeable that women can-  
vassed for both the Socialist and the  
Republican candidates in the capital.  
Not a few, mostly advanced deputies,  
have been returned pledged to support  
women's rights, which for the first  
time have played a part in an Italian  
election, and will be heard of in the  
new chamber, as in the old, only with  
more persistency.

The Vatican is known to have sus-  
tained the non-expedit in 72 consti-  
tuencies; in many more Clericals doubt-  
less voted without the permission of the  
ecclesiastical authorities. Except, how-  
ever, in a few places like Milan, where  
interest in politics is keen, the con-  
course at the polls was small. In the  
five divisions of Rome only 50 per cent  
of the registered electors voted—a pro-  
portion a little higher than in 1904. In  
no Roman constituency was the aid  
of the Clericals able to secure the elec-  
tion of a Conservative candidate; in  
one alone did the Clerical vote give a  
Conservative a chance of election at the  
second ballot. In Milan, however, the  
Clericals were well organized, and,  
therefore, successful. In several con-  
stituencies priests and members of re-  
ligious orders not only voted, but also  
took part in forming the committees  
of the different polling stations.


