

SABBATH MEETINGS.—At the morning's meeting Elder John Taylor first addressed the congregation; he gave a very interesting account of his late visit to the States. He was followed by Elder Geo. B. Wallace, who spoke of his approaching mission, and his former labors in preaching the gospel among the nations.

In the afternoon Elder James Sharp, just returned from a mission to Europe, Bishop John Sharp and Elder A. Milton Musser addressed the assembly.

THEATRE.—On Saturday evening the assembly at the Theatre witnessed an exhibition of intense dramatic power in Mr. Warner's impersonation of "Sir Giles Overreach." The reputation he has achieved in this character was fully sustained, and it is perhaps not too much to say that in the leading role of Mowbray's great play he has no superior living.

Miss Lockhart, as "Margaret Overreach" and the remainder of the corps dramatique rendered efficient support.

To-night "Macbeth" will be presented, with Locke's beautiful music.

Mr. Warner will appear as "Macbeth," Mr. D. McKenrie as "Macduff," Miss Lockhart as "Lady Macbeth," Mrs. L. Carless, the prima donna of Utah, Mr. James Harris and other talented vocalists will appear in the solos and choruses.

THE GRAND JURY.—By reference to our minutes of this morning's session of the District Court, it will be seen that there are yet so many delinquents in the panel of the Grand Jury that no business can be done. Notwithstanding several official visits by Marshal McAllister to Weber and Tooele counties during the past week, with attachments for several persons summoned from those parts, there is yet a fatal gap remaining in the quota.

We have a word to say here. While for the causes which originally necessitate the holding of courts and for litigation in general, we entertain no special relish. The statutes provide for the holding of courts, in which the emancipation of jurors from the duties of the city. A District Court has by law the right to summon jurors from any locality within the district. The Third Judicial District Court, now sitting in this city, embraces, if we remember correctly, all the counties northward of Utah county. Hence, citizens of Salt Lake, Weber or Tooele, or other northern counties summoned as jurors, are expected to attend promptly, unless a substantial excuse can be rendered for absence, when the excuse should be furnished the Marshal, or court, that the party may be legally excused; otherwise he is liable to penalty at the discretion of the Court.

A citizen should esteem it one of the privileges of his birthright or adoption, as well as a solemn duty on his part, to serve his country in this or any other lawful capacity; and we apprehend the present delinquencies to have for the most part arisen from a misconception of obligation in these respects. We are informed that the major portion of the Grand Jury summoned to attend the District Court at September sitting have been thus perplexed, kept in suspense by the non-compliance of a few delinquents. We trust that a repetition of this will not occur.

CARELESS FIRING.—Mr. James Townsend, of the Townsend House, informs us that this morning he extracted a leaden bullet from the front of the north wing of his hotel, about six and a half feet from the ground, fired just before from the direction of East Temple Street.

We have frequently called attention to the danger arising from carelessly discharging fire-arms, so common of late in the city. The danger of life being sacrificed through this very foolish and culpable habit, is imminent, and the very heaviest penalties imposed by the city ordinances should be inflicted on parties guilty of it. Unless severe examples are made of such parties we fear this most inexcusable and reprehensible practice will never cease until serious accident is inflicted or life sacrificed. It would be well if the police officers would keep a sharp look-out to suppress this nuisance, and promptly arrest those guilty of committing it.

THE PULPIT FIELD.—As advertised, a meeting was held at the 17th Ward School House on Saturday evening of those interested in reclaiming the tract of land—about two thousand acres—known as the Pulpit Field, which for the last eight years has been overflowed by the waters of the Jordan river, and is common of late in the city.

DISTRICT COURT.—His Honor Chief Justice Wilson, presiding, the case of J. P. Nounnan & Co. vs. Union Pacific Railroad being called, the calling of the Court was given upon some preliminary pleadings, counsel for defense were granted leave to amend, and the case was continued.

MEN'S JOS. F. NOUNNAN & CO. were large contributors to the U. P. R. R., and they claim as yet due from them that company upwards of \$400,000. Their complaint sets forth that they sustained heavy damages at the outset through the delay of the company in having the line constructed. They also allege that the fulfillment of a promise by the company's engineers of a reclassification and re-measurement of their work, the classification and measurement was unsatisfactory. This is an important, and will doubtless be a hotly contested case.

The petit jury was called, and the Grand Jury being yet incomplete, was discharged until Monday next at 2 o'clock, p.m. In the mean time further summary process will be ordered to fill up the panel of the grand jury.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, U.T.,

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 3.

I. The resignation of Major General Aaron Johnson, 2nd Division Nauvoo Legion, Commandant of Utah military district, is accepted. He is honorably released and will be kindly remembered by the Legion.

II. Brigadier General Wm. B. Pace is assigned to the command of Utah Military district until further orders.

III. It is with regret that the sudden demise of Brigadier General Ezra T. Benson, Commandant of Cache Military district, is announced to the Legion. Colonel William Hyde will take command of said district until further orders.

IV. During the absence of Brigadier General Lot Smith, the command of Davis Military district is assigned to Col. George Chase, who will complete the organization of the forces of the district, including Davis and Morgan counties.

V. Major General Robert T. Burton, Commandant of Salt Lake Military district, will cause a general muster to be held for three days, of all the forces within said district, for the purposes of drill, inspection, and camp duty, not later than the first week in November next.

VI. The Commandants of Utah, Juab, Sanpete, Panguin, Iron, Davis, Weber, Cache, Richland, Tooele, Summit, and Wasatch Military districts, will cause to be held a similar muster, not to exceed three days, of all the forces in their respective districts, not later than the first week in November next.

VII. Said Commandants will cause suitable notice to be given of the time and place of muster, and all persons liable to military duty to be duly enrolled and notified. Musicians are required to perform military duty as musicians, or in the line, and will be enrolled accordingly. Bands may be organized in each district and assigned to duty by district commanders.

VIII. Commandants of districts will organize the forces of their districts according to General Orders No. 2 of May 25, 1890, and cause all vacancies in their commands to be filled during the muster, and will make full and complete returns of said organization and muster to this office on or before the tenth day of November next. They are also enjoined to enforce good order and sobriety, and take every precaution to avert the occurrence of accidents from any cause during the muster.
