BISHOP SMITH IS DEAD.

Bishop Thomas X. Smith died this morning at his home in the Fourth ward, after a severe illness, commencng with a paralytic stroke five years

ing with a paralytic stroke five years age. Bishop Smith was born in Eaton Bray, Bedfordshire, England, Dec. 25, 1828, and was therefore 75 years old on Christmas. He became a member of the Mormon Church in 1848, and came to Utah in 1864. He first settled at Farmington, where he lived until 1860, when he came to Lozan. He has been closely identified with the development of this valley from its first settlement, being prominent in its public affairs. He was the bishop of the Fourth ward for nearly 46 years, until he resigned a few months ago on account of failing health. He was the father of twenty-two children sixteen of whom are still living. Among them are Orson Smith, one of Logan's leading citizens and for a number of years president of the orig-inal Cache stake, and Miss Hattle Smith, ex-auditor of Logan City.
