Ogden, Jan. 2.—Gus Deams, a young Greek, was placed under arrest yesterday by Officer Thomas Burke on the charge of shooting J. H. Emerson, an employee of the Harriman lines at the freight depot.

The shooting occurred near an outfit car occupied by the Greeks and was the result of mistaken identity.

Prest. Irvine of Commercial Club Replies to Dr. Slater.

Provo, Jan. 2.—The impression might be gained from the introduction to the first paragraph of Dr. Slater's letter, as published in last night's "News," that there are objections on the part of the citizens of Provo to the enforcement of laws and ordinances against uncleanliness. Such objection is not at all general. The objection raised was on account of the report being sent to the state board of health and the great publicity given the matter. President Irvine of the Commercial club in a letter replying to Dr. Slater's communication says:

"The objections that have been raised by the citizens against Dr. Slater's actions are not on account of enforcing the ordinances, but on account of applying to state officials to help run the little affairs of this little city. This city, with its officers and citizens, should be and is simply able to govern itself, and will brook no unwarranted outside interference." * * *

"The Commercial club was organized for the furtherance of the best interests of Provo city, and naturally its members, together with all good citizens, would object to the city being advertised as being filthy and incompetent. Neither do I think that any citizen, who had the interests of the city at heart, would so wish to defame it by calling on the state officers to clean up our door yards."

According to the information given the police the Greeks have been missing various articles from their car, and decided to place a watchman at the car to protect their property. Mr. Emerson went over to the car to get some coal to make a fire with, and was in the act of carrying a large lump away when Deams appeared on the scene and commanded the supposed intruder to drop the coal. Instead Emerson continued to walk away from the car and Deams fired at him the bullet penetrating the fleshy part of his left arm. A physician crossed the road, which is painful but not dangerous. Immediately after the shooting Officer Burke was on the scene and arrested the Greek, who it is expected will have to answer to the charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

SHOWS HIT BY SKATING RINKS.

Diverting of Vandeville Patronage Closes Lyceum Temporarily.

Ogden, Jan. 2.—The skating rink craze which struck Ogden a few months ago has played havoc with the cheap theater business of Ogden. The vaudeville theaters did an immense business in this city for several years, and were prospering when the skating craze came along. It was then the patronage to the vaudeville houses stopped to a great degree. As a result the Lyceum has closed its doors for the present at least. The manager, Mr. Young, has been losing money for some time, and decided that it was best to close up shop. The patronage at the Utah and Grand Opera House has not been what it should be, but the managements have succeeded in making expenses.
