How many mulberry trees in your county or district? How many understand the handling of the worms? How many cocoons have been raised in years past, that is to say annually?

Pushing the Edmunds Law.

Last Saturday morning Deputy McEllan arrested John Alma Pace, of Thistle Station; on the charge of unlawful cohabitation. He appeared before the commissioner, with his alleged plural wife, and was bound over in the sum of \$1000, to await an investigation by the next grand jury. The bonds of the plural wife were placed at \$600.

Yesterday morning in the "grey hours," Deputies McEllan and Bennett made an excursion into Spanish Fork cañon, above Thistle, and arrested Joseph Brudish on the charge of unlawful cohabitation, and subpoenaed his second wife at the same time. He waived examination and was released on furnishing bonds in the sum of \$800. The plural wife was liberated on \$400 bail. This is another case to be investigated by the grand jury.

The case of Thomas Shelley, who was arrested last week at American Fork, and who pleaded not guilty to the charge of unlawful cohabitation when before the Commissioner, was called up yesterday morning. Several witnesses had been subpoenaed. On appearing, however, the defendant waived examination, and was bound over, till the sitting of the next grand jury, in \$1000 bail.—*Provo Enquirer, June 26.*

ST. JOSEPH STAKE CONFERENCE.

The quarterly conference of the St. Joseph Stake of Zion, was held at Pima, June 16 and 17, and was presided over by Stake President Christopher Layton.

There were on the stand, besides the Presidency of the Stake, High Counsellors, Bishops and other leading men of the Stake.

After the usual opening exercises on Saturday afternoon a portion of the time was occupied by President Layton in speaking of the condition of affairs throughout the Stake, following which the Bishops gave their reports, showing the Stake to be in a fairly prosperous condition, the people, with but few exceptions, enjoying good health, and being blessed with unusually good crops.

During the quarter there has been one Ward newly organized, which is called Matthew Ward, over which L. H. Matthews is Bishop.

At Pima there is a Spanish school which is tolerably well attended, and of which those who attend speak highly.

The different quarrels and associations were reported by their respective officers as being in a healthy condition.

The speakers discoursed upon the first principles of the Gospel, tithes and offerings, the Word of Wisdom, the establishing of home industries with a view to become self sustaining, home improvement, and planting orchards and vineyards.

There were exhibited on the stand ripe peaches, apricots and plums that were raised in Pima.
