

## THEY WANT THE EIGHT HOUR DAY

Municipal Laws Committee Favors it Upon All Public Work.

## CANNING ON BOILER SHOPS

Does Not Consider Them Nuisances—Government Letter Referring to Parley's Watershed Matter.

Stephen Tyne, Pearl Hill and Hiram Clark constituted a committee from the Utah Federation of Labor, which last night appeared before the municipal laws committee of the City Council. They came to ask that an ordinance be enacted which shall have for its object the establishment of an eight-hour day upon all municipal work. This request is made under the State law, providing for an eight-hour day upon all public work. The committee favored the passage of an ordinance to this effect, and such a paper will be drawn up by the city attorney, to whom the matter was referred.

## ABOUT BOILER SHOPS.

There is a boiler repair shop located on First West street near Second South, and last night a petition from residents of that vicinity was considered by the committee on municipal laws. In this paper the signers protested against the din made by the boilermakers and asked that it be stopped. Mr. Canning thought the boiler shop was not a nuisance for the reason that it emitted no bad smell. However, the matter was referred to the city attorney, to whom the matter was referred.

## OBJECT TO RATES.

The waterworks committee was last night requested by the Rio Grande Railway company to reduce the charges for water consumed by the railroad. The company asked for a rate of three cents per 1,000 gallons, saying that even then, under the meter system, it would cost the corporation about \$3,000 per year. Reference of the matter was made to the city engineer, who will inform the committee as to rates extant in other cities in the United States.

## PARLEY'S WATERSHED.

Mayor Thompson has received a letter from the department of the interior, calling attention to the fact that the public lands in the Parley's watershed are not all in one tract, but are cut up and alternate with Union Pacific and other parcels. The number of private holdings within the watershed are cited as a reason for the inadvisability of including the entire district within the proposed watershed reserve. The department wants to know if separate reservations of the individual unappropriated tracts will be acceptable and it is this question that the laws committee and the city engineer now have under consideration.

## \$2,000 TO LITTLE GIRL.

Dr. McAdrian Leaves Substantial Evidence of His Benevolence.

Little Clara Dwyer is the Beneficiary—Had Become Attached to Her.

Through the death of the late Dr. McAdrian, Little Clara Virginia Dwyer comes into the possession of \$2,000. This is the most substantial evidence of the late doctor's benevolence that has come to light, and it happened in this way: Soon after the doctor and his mother arrived in this city they obtained the service of Mrs. Mary Dwyer as housekeeper. The lady had recently come from Chicago, bringing with her the infant daughter of her sister, who had died a few months prior to their coming West. At first Mrs. Dwyer feared that the child would be a source of annoyance to the McAdrians, and therefore kept her in the background. The doctor, however, soon discovered the restraint that was put upon the child, and at once told Mrs. Dwyer that the little one was to have the freedom of the house, and if she could not make good enough to suit her, he would step in and assist her.

As the child grew, both Mrs. McAdrian and the doctor became extremely fond of her, and when the doctor's mother died, although he gave up housekeeping, he still associated with Clara and materially assisted her. When he identified himself with the A. O. U. W., he made her his beneficiary, and her name so appears on the records of the lodge. And so it seems that a kindly fate was watching over the child when she was left an orphan, and the heart of a great city. This competence, which she has received from her true friend, comes to her at the most opportune time when she is just entering into her school life.

Clara was at the bedside when her friend passed away, and her excessive grief was very touching, as she felt toward him as a daughter feels towards a father, because he had been a father to her, and although she knew nothing of the \$2,000, she felt that she had lost one of her truest friends and benefactors.

## SALT LAKE HURT.

Bert Seaboldt Injured at the Gilsonite Mines in Eastern Utah.

Bert Seaboldt of Salt Lake arrived here yesterday and is at the Brown Palace Hotel nursing a lame back, the result of over-exertion in getting work started at the Gilsonite mines on the western boundary of the State, and of an accident at the bathing pool at Glenwood Springs.

Mr. Seaboldt says that work has now fairly started on the big Gilsonite deposit, and shipments are being regu- larly made. A force of ten men is en- gaged in taking out the material. The Gilsonite is hauled to the Rio Grande railroad at Rifle, a distance of sixty miles. The company represented by Mr. Seaboldt has decided to build a branch line from the Gilsonite field to the station. Mr. Seaboldt is now engaged in making a former survey of the line, and says the work will be started in the line early in the fall. The grade will be quite light, and the line will be built following the valley of one of the branches of the White river coming from the south. Keegan, No. 2812 Williams street. She will remain in Denver for about two weeks before she returns to her home in Salt Lake City. Asked about her experience at the Kansas City convention, she said:

"I had no thrilling experiences. Every one treated me very nicely, and showed me every possible considera- tion. I would like to have a chance to take every one of them."

"Did the delegates seem to take kindly to having a woman among their number?"

"Well, they said they did," Mrs. Cohen replied. "I was introduced to a great many of them, and I asked every one of them, as soon as they were in- troduced, whether they objected to having a woman as a delegate. All re- plied that, instead of objecting to women delegates, they were glad that the Democrats had taken the initiative in making a Democratic convention, and there had to be enthusiasm. ## NO NEWS FROM LORD ROBERTS.

Nothing Further About Nitral's Nek Affair—Boers Wore Khaki Suits, Deceiving the British—List of Casualties Will be Large—London in Gloom.

London, July 12.—Lord Roberts has sent nothing further concerning the Nitral's Nek affair. Pretoria dispatches, however, show that the Lincolnschires lost half their officers, including Col. Roberts, who was wounded and taken prisoner. Stragglers continue to arrive at the camp. Few further details can be gathered.

The British fought stubbornly until nightfall, when the cavalry turned their horses loose.

The Boer report of the engagement places the British casualties at over 200. In the Dorsetport affair mentioned in Lord Roberts' dispatch, the men in the front rank of the Boers wore khaki uniforms and helmets, and the dragoons passed them unobserved, under the impression that they were Hussars. The mistake was not discovered until

the Boers opened a heavy fire, when the dragoons were 400 yards distant. The prisoners who escaped to Kroon- stad report that Gen. De Wet's force of 1,000 men with large guns expelled from Bethlehem by Gen. Clements and Gen. Buller, have taken up a standing posi- tion four miles to the southward in the hills around Retief Nek. President Steyn is reported to be with them.

Another case of the Boers wearing khaki is said to have happened at Lindley on June 26th, when they sur- prised a picket of twenty-five men of the Yorkshire light infantry, eighteen of whom were killed or wounded.

## CLERY AT WITPOORT.

Witpoort, Transvaal, July 13.—Gen. Clery's column, which has moved east- ward, is now camped here. During the march the mounted infantry engaged 200 Boers, shelling a ridge occupied by the burghers. It is estimated that this movement will clear the country from Standerton to Heidelberg. The troops found but one remaining laager, from which the Boers retired hurriedly.

## BLANKET INDIAN TROUBLE.

The Danger of an Outbreak Among the Red River Reds is Increasing.

Bulletins Posted Warning Friendly Whites and Others to Remain Away—Leave for Agency.

Solway, Minn., July 13.—Danger of an outbreak by the Blanket Indians on Red Lake is increasing. The Indian police from the agency have gone out to the lake, where the Blanketets are still holding their war dance, and it is ex- pected trouble will ensue.

Bulletins have been posted in the Chippewa land agency, warning all friendly Indians and whites to remain away from the party or suffer the con- sequences. Ten mounted men left Solway late last night and will pro- ceed to the agency and take instruc- tions from Indian Agent Mercer.

A petition will be sent to Gov. Lind, asking that a detachment of State troops be sent to Red Lake at once. The Indians keep up their war dances and their shouts can be heard for three miles at frequent intervals. They dis- charge their rifles in the air, and it is said that a large body of reds from the northern part of the State had joined forces with the Blanketets and main body of Indians are joining the force. It is estimated that the en- tire force numbers over 200 at present.

The squaws and papooses have been sent north and only the young bucks remain at the point. The white settlers at the point are preparing for an at- tack. The Indian at the agency have assured the whites of their assistance, but it is thought that many of them are going over to the Blanketets.

Nothing has been heard from Capt. Mercer since his departure for the lake, and fears are entertained for his safety.

## WILL EXAMINE THE BOOKS.

Stockholders Win Against American Spirits Manufacturing Co.

New York, July 14.—The appellate division of the supreme court in Broo- lyn has handed down a decision affirm- ing the order of Justice Jenks on April 7, permitting Mr. Reiss, chairman of the Stockholders' Protective committee of the American Spirits Manufacturing company, to examine the books, papers, contracts, agents and employees of the company.

Leopold Wallach, of Wallach and Cook, of counsel for Mr. Reiss, said "examination will take place forth- with."

This action was begun as a result of the formation of the present distilling company of American, which took over the American Spirits Manufacturing company, the Kentucky Distillers and Warehouse company, the Standard Distilling and Distributing company, of New Jersey, and the Spirits Distribut- ing company.

## Alienated His Wife's Affections.

Portland, Ore., July 14.—Ex-Senator H. W. Corbett has filed an answer to the suit for \$100,000 damages recently brought by E. E. Peterson of Butte, Montana, for alienation of his wife's affections. He enters a general denial of the allegations in the complaint. Mr. Corbett said: "I do not wish to pre- judice the case by publicly discussing it before it is heard in court, and can only repeat what I have said before, that while I am willing to contribute to charity I will defend myself against blackmail to the bitter end. I have re- ceived numerous letters from different parts of the State, all explaining the situation. They tell me that my per- sonal character is from political sources, and got up for the purpose of affecting me politically."

## Hawaiian Delegates Going Home.

Chicago, July 14.—Judge A. M. Ke- polkai, Samuel Parker, S. B. Wilson and Harold Sewell, all from the Ha- waiian Islands, left this city last night for San Francisco. Two members of the party, Judge Kepolokai and Samuel Parker, acted as the representatives of the Hawaiian Republic at the national convention ever held in the island, and were present at the Republican national convention at Philadelphia as dele- gates. Owing to a misunderstanding, the territorial representatives of the delegates, but with the proviso that if the number allotted to the islands was but two, Judge Kepolokai and Samuel Parker should act in that capacity.

## N. Y. Republican League Clubs.

New York, July 14.—The members of the Republican league of this State, who will take part in the national con- vention of league clubs at St. Paul, Minnesota, July 17, 18 and 19, will leave this city today and will be joined by delegates from New York, Albany, Troy, Utica, Syracuse and Rochester, Buffalo and other western cities. New York's delegation will aggregate about 100.

## Governor of Australia.

London, July 14.—It is announced that the queen has approved the se- lection of the Earl of Hopetown as gov- ernor general of the Australian com- monwealth.

## Export Houses to Consolidate.

New York, July 14.—It is announced that negotiations are about com- pleted for the merging of the business of the export houses of the Flint, Eddy & Co., and the American Trading company. Both these concerns do an immense business in the far East. Flint, Eddy & Co. are capitalized at \$3,500,000 and the American Trading Co. at \$250,000.

## SAVINGS BANK CLOSES.

Police Reserves Called Out to Pre- serve Order Among Depositors.

New York, July 12.—The directors of the Dime Savings Bank of Newark, N. J., decided today to close the institu- tion's doors until its affairs can be straightened out. The announcement that Charles Westervelt, the bank's se- cretary and treasurer, had been arrested on a charge of having stolen a large sum of money caused a large crowd of depositors to assemble today to with- draw their funds and there was much excitement when it was learned that the doors would not be opened. Police reserves were called out to preserve order. President Orton is preparing a statement of the bank's affairs. West- ervelt was arrested last night and was committed to jail in default of \$10,000 bail. The specific charge against him is that he raised a withdrawal check from \$200 to \$1,200.

## Caught Robbing a Store.

Marshalltown, Iowa, July 12.—Four men were caught in the act of robbing Mason and Whitehill's general at State Center early today. A number of citi- zens surrounded the building and a pitched battle ensued. Ben Whitehill, one of the proprietors, was shot in the leg. One of the robbers was also wound- ed, and, with one of his associates, was captured. The other two escaped.

## C. & G. W. Ry. Shops on Fire.

St. Paul, Minn., July 12.—Fire broke out in the buildings formerly the Chic- ago & Great Western railway shops at south St. Paul, at 1 o'clock, and at 3

o'clock seven buildings and a number of railroad cars had been destroyed, and the flames were not under control. The fire is said to have been caused by an explosion of oil. The shops of the rail- road company were recently moved to Osceola, Iowa, and the buildings here were used as storerooms.

Shanghai Consuls Want to See One Received by a Merchant.

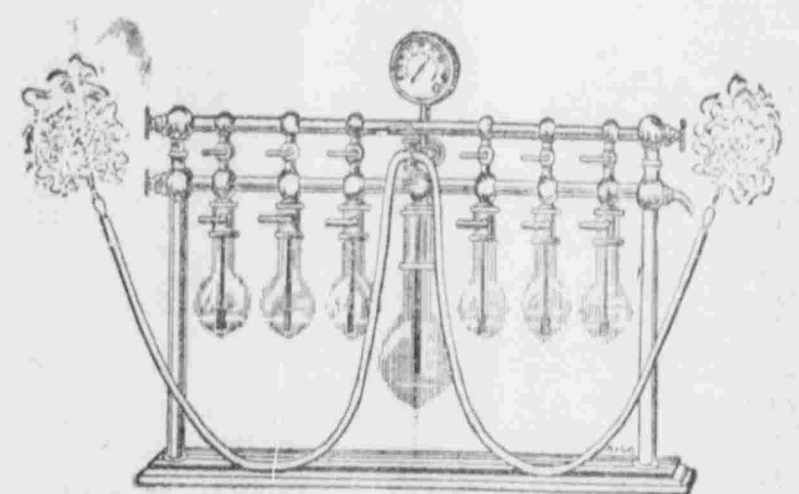
