Mrs. Giley's Trial.

In the Fourth district court Mrs. Giley was on trial charged with having used the U. S. mail feloniously, or transmitting淫秽 material, or obscene matter, or "obscene, profane, indecent, or obscene" and sending the said thing through the U. S. mail. Inspectors Henry Price and Captain Nichols of the U. S. mail detectives are present. It is now known that during the winter Mrs. Giley over the signature of Mrs. W. H. Emerson, and alleged as witness, circulates and letters which had been deposited in the Ogden post office. These were of a very serious nature. The judge sent for the U. S. mail and directed them to come to him. Mrs. Giley, accused postmistress at Ogden, testified in trial from Denver being delivered to Mrs. Giley and of receiving a registered package in the Denver address.

Proved Fatal.
