DeGraw insists upon an ad-herence to the regulations requiring that boxes on rural mail routes shall be erected by the roadside so that car-riers can easily obtain access to them without deviating from their routes or dismounting from their volicles. Failure to comply, the decision states, is likely to result in the discontinu-ance of the delivery of mail.

#### San Juan del Rio Mountains.

Durango, Mexico, March 27.-In a desperate fight between rurales and a band of outlaws under Gumersindo Ortega, in the San Juan del Rio mour tains, Ortega, who was considered one of the most dangerous bandits in north-western Mexico, and his band were driven into the mountains with the rurales in close pursuit.
