Boise, Idaho, Aug. 19 .- Much to the regret of hundreds of people who had been anxiously waiting an opportunity to hear the famous Mormon Tabernacle choir in this city, the sacred concert announced for next Sunday evening has been cancelled. It transpires that there is an ordinance in Boise which prohibits theaters from opening their doors on Sunday evenings under a penalty, and under a strict interpretation of the law it is illegal even to give a free concert. Manager Pinney of the theater offered the house free, and prominent citizens urged that the concert be given, but Geo. E. Carpenter, the business manager of the choir. who is in Bolse this morning, decided to take no chances, and it was re-luctantly decided that the choir would 2 bld not stop at Boise. Both the papers here, the Statesman, and the Capital News, point out the absurdity of the law which permits Sunday baseball, but will not allow a sacred concert on a Sunday evening.
