MONROE CITIZEN KILLED IN RUNAWAY AT EUREKA

MONROE, Sevier county, Nov. 8.—On Monday last the report came from Eureka that Medames Sarah Gould and Mary Swain, who were there on a visit to their sons, were severely injured in a runaway accident, and

that their husbands were to start on first train. Later information stated that Mrs. Swain was dragged for some distance and had her arm and nose broken, several scalp wounds, and other bodily injuries which left her unconscious from which she never rallied until death came to her relief on the fourth inst.

Her remains were brought to the Elmore depot on Friday night where a cortege of 40 carriages filled with sympathetic friends met to conduct with the bereaved husband. Funeral services were held at the meetinghouse yesterday. The services being conducted by Bishop Joseph H. Jensen. Beautiful and appropriate selections were rendered by the choir under the direction of Choirmaster Thomas Rasmussen. The speakers were, William A. Warnock, Constant Thomsen and Jacob Magleby, all eloquent that excellent qualities of the departed. Sixty carriages followed the remains to the cemetery where after singing the dedicatory prayer was offered by Elder Joseph A. Johnson.
Mrs. Swain was born July 22, 1863, at Zurich, Switzerland; came to Utah with her mother in 1871, and in 1872 came to Monroe, where she has resided ever since. At her death she was co-soulsor in the Relief society of Monroe North ward. Her husband, mother, four sons and two daughters, also brother and sisters survive her.
Mrs. Gould, the other unfortunate in the accident, is still at Eureka in a somewhat critical condition, her ankle being badly mashed and she suffers from other serious injuries about her head and body. Franklin Gould, who

had the care of horse and buggy at time of the accident, is also suffering from injuries.

BURIAL OF ISAAC ASAY.
