

The offers are declined, as Russia does not stand in need of medical or military

## Japan Agrees to Note.

Tokio, Feb. 17 .- It is stated on high authority that the Japanese government, in responding through United States Minister Griscom to Secy. Hay's note, agreed to the neutralization of China, excluding Manchuria, which

Russia is now occupying. Japan, it is also said, reserves the right to counter-balance any action of Russia in violating China's neutrality. In the event that the American con-sulate is endangered, it is stated that Commander Staunton will land blue-jackets and marines for the protection of Consul Miller.
