

not even gone through one leg, and that the intense pain in the other was from sympathy. Elam expressed a regret that he did not demand another shot. He was perfectly cool and collected and gave directions in a strong and composed voice. Beltrne also acted deliberately, and although pale he seemed perfectly cool. He was taken away by his seconds. Afterwards they discovered that Elam could not again stand.

The wound is evidently very serious. After the ball struck him, Elam gave one or two steps forward, and from that it was thought the leg was not broken. The surgeon, however, stated that the muscle would have sustained him that length of time.

NEW YORK, 1.—At a meeting of the Central Labor Union a motion was made that General Butler be invited to act as Grand Marshal, or orator of the day, September 15 next, when the Union will have a parade and picnic. The chairman ruled that General Butler could not be permitted to act as Grand Marshal, as he is not a representative of any labor organization and that he is a politician. It would be against the constitution of the Union to invite him to act as orator. The latter ruling was appealed from and the appeal sustained. A warm discussion followed. Some of the delegates referring to General Butler as a representative of the laboring classes of Massachusetts, while others said he is a designing politician and a capitalist, a stockholder in three mills at Fall River, where miserable wages are paid the hands. The matter was finally laid on the table.

BRADFORD, 1.—There was an accident on the Rochester & Pittsburg railroad this morning early, at Rappahannock, 25 miles southeast of this city. The first section of a coal train to which was attached a passenger car containing 15 persons, broke in two on a heavy grade. Seven cars rushed down grade and ran into the second section, smashing the car to pieces, killing six and wounding others.

The second section, consisting of seven heavy loaded coal cars and a passenger coach, immediately started down the steep grade and while going at the frightful speed of 80 miles an hour collided with the engine of the approaching coal train. The passenger car was well filled and the destruction of life was appalling. Seven have already died from injuries and others are fatally hurt. A relief train with three surgeons and a number of employees of the company on board was despatched to the scene at 5 o'clock this morning. The killed and injured were brought to this city, and as far as can be learned their names are as follows: S. N. Toller, aged 34, conductor of the Bradford Home, was terribly mangled. He died instantly. David Ford, brakeman of Bradford, had both legs broken and was fatally injured internally. Mike Doun, brakeman of Bradford, had both feet cut off and was fatally injured. He died at 4 p. m. George Quinn of Bradford, traveling salesman, died on the relief train. Angelo Odone and Italian laborer was instantly killed. W. S. Davis of Olean, Pa., had a terrible gash on his head and it is supposed he is fatally hurt. L. J. McKee of Bradford, died at noon while being carried into his house. Robert Clemons of Bradford, had his neck broken and body badly crushed, he was killed outright. James O. Connell, of Alton, Pa., was dangerously injured. Joseph Ravella of Alton was badly hurt and will probably not recover. Mrs. W. H. McCurdy with baby, of Bradford, slightly cut about the head and arms and the child bruised. John Collins of Limestone, N. Y., was badly hurt on the head. J. Bosway had several ribs broken and severe contusions about the head. J. Cosmillo, Italian, had a leg broken in two places. R. Cosmillo, his brother, had his ribs stove in, his condition is critical. "Pop" Downs, engineer of the second train was the only one hurt in his crew. He saw the covered section approaching and after reversing his engine jumped, escaping with slight bruises. Coroner Bannan empaneled a jury who visited the scene of the wreck by special train to-day and will take testimony and render a verdict tomorrow. Mrs. McCauley, who was only slightly injured, has made a statement in which she says the conductor and both brakemen who were in the car with her were asleep. It is not yet known to whom the blame is most to be attached.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., 1.—Pawtucket

et was visited this morning by the most destructive fire for many years. Flames were discovered at 5.30 in an unoccupied building, the "Old Arcade," on the rear of East Avenue. The flames spread rapidly. After destroying the Arcade building, the fire extended to adjoining buildings until a dozen were on fire at once. The Dexter Yarn Company's mill, office and store-house, a large wooden building, were destroyed. The mill was used to manufacture knitting cotton. The books and papers of the company and private papers of H. H. Thomas, president, were saved. Total loss, \$115,000; insured.

CHICAGO, 1.—The outgoing Kansas Pacific express on the Wabash Road, to-night, collided with the street car at Root Street crossing, in the southern city limits, smashing it to fragments. The lamp in the car exploded and set fire to it. Of 13 persons in the car only one escaped unhurt and it is believed that two or three of the worst injured will die. Several were badly burned before they could be extricated from the blazing fragments. The accident occurred from the driver of the street car misunderstanding the signal stationed at the crossing.

Tribune's Mayville, Colorado: This morning Dick Baeker came to town and amused himself by shooting into several buildings. The city constable being absent, Mayor John Martin undertook to stop the disturbance when Baeker commenced firing at him. The mayor then put for balls in Baeker, causing his death.

NEW HAVEN, 1.—A Novel race between Frederick Hughes' catamaran Jessie and Ezra Doggett's horse named Boston, from New York to Stony Creek, Conn., was won by the catamaran, which passed New Haven at 2.30 and landed at Stony Creek dock at 3.25 this afternoon. The horse passed through here going a six miles an hour gait and showing signs of fatigue at 6.30 p. m., arriving at his destination at 9 o'clock. The race was for \$1,000 a side.

SOUTH ABINGDON, Mass. 1.—Reed & Closson's shoe factory was burned here. Loss \$175,000; partially insured.

NEW YORK, 1.—The steamship Nevada brings 630 Mormon converts, in charge of 22 missionaries. The converts are from Sweden, Denmark, Wales, England and Norway. The number of men and women are about equal.

Agnes S. Wynne, of Brooklyn, was fatally shot to day by her husband, Jas. H. Wynne. Mrs. Wynne was 19 years old and her husband one year younger. They were married 18 months ago and have one child three months old. He had been drinking heavily to-day, and a quarrel took place, in which he threatened to shoot her, and she answered, "I dare you to do it." At this time Mrs. Wynne was lying on the bed with her babe beside her. The boy husband drew his revolver and fired, the bullet entering his wife's breast. He then went for a physician. Subsequently Mrs. Wynne was taken to the hospital and the wound pronounced fatal. Wynne was arrested. Two playmates of Mrs. Wynne witnessed the shooting.

LOUISIANA, Mo., 2.—Bill McDowell, the negro arrested on Thursday charged with outrage upon Miss Kate Murray, of this city, was taken to jail at Bowling Green. Early this morning a party of masked men from this vicinity went to Bowling Green, broke into the jail, secured the prisoner, and after extorting a full confession, hung him. The negro also confessed having fled from Southern Missouri on account of a similar crime there. Subsequently the body was taken to Louisiana where it was again hung up and photographed, then taken down and its head cut off. McDowell confessed the crime and said he had served a term in the penitentiary.

CINCINNATI, 2.—A special from Brazil, Ind., says: Sanders who was convicted of murdering his wife, was sentenced to imprisonment for life on Saturday. He tried to kill himself by poison after his sentence, but failed.

RICHMOND, Va., 2.—Information this morning from Stephen Lewis' residence in Rockhampton County, where Mr. Elam was taken after being wounded, is that the wound is much more aggravated than at first reported and that Elam's condition is critical. The ball struck near the right hip, passed inward and downward through the body and lodged in the left thigh, passing in its course very near the bladder.

der. The ball was extracted last evening.

Auburn, N. Y., 2.—Abram Coppernoll, a farmer of the town of Victory, was shot three times with a large navy revolver yesterday, by Lew French, a young farm laborer. Suspected intimacy with Coppernoll's wife caused the trouble. The wife was present at the shooting and ordered French to fire, both are under arrest. The victim will die, all three shots took effect in the body.

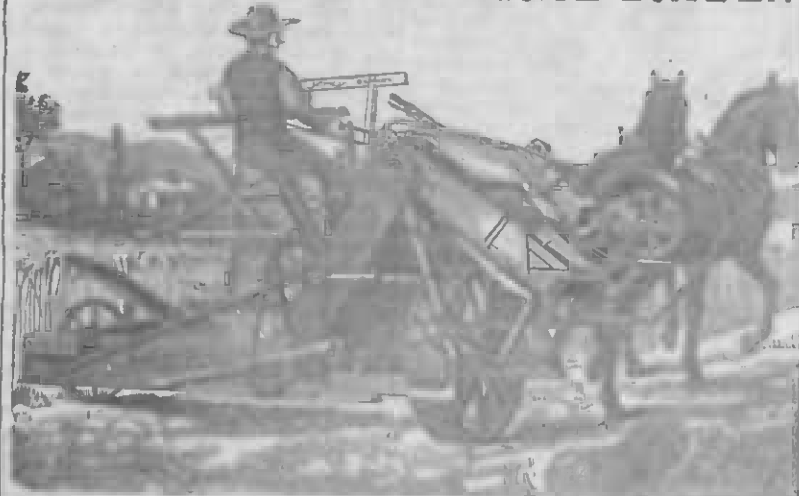
