EASTERN.
Set by Government Officers.

MILWAUKEE, 9.—The rectifying
house, residence and all the property
of J. P. Kinsinger, of this city, were
seized by the collector of internal
revenue to-day, for an as-
essment of \$268,000 against the
Union Copper Distilling Co. of
Chicago, of which Kinsinger is a
stockholder.

Gene to Investigate.
NEW ORLEANS, 9.—The acting
governor, this evening, dispatched
Vigil Captain Campbell, of the
State militia, to Clinton, to in-
vestigate the state of affairs, and re-
port the necessary action in refer-
ence to the shooting of Smith, the
colored sheriff.

Resigned.
NEW YORK, 9.—Police commis-
sioners Smith and Voorhes re-
signed this morning; Matze and
Dabnecker, who still hold office, are
the two against whom the most se-
rious charges have been made,
and whose dismissal in default of
resignation is regarded as a foregone
conclusion.

Silver to be Coined—Officers Elected.
The assay office in Wall street,
yesterday, sent to Philadelphia, for
coinage, ten tons of silver. It is
understood that this shipment is
intended for the subsidiary coinage,
for conversion into quarters and
twenty and ten cent pieces.

The Red Cloud Report.
The Red Cloud commissioners
will complete their report to-day,
and they expect to go forward
to Washington to-morrow. No
information as to the substance of
the report could be obtained.

The New Secretary of the Interior.
WASHINGTON, 9.—Postmaster
Carmichael, who has been nomi-
nated by the Interior, will probably
arrive on Monday, and at once
begin the discharge of his duties;
they both declined to divulge the
name of the appointee, or of what
State he is, but that, so far as
known, would be a violation of
confidence.

Mississippi Affairs.
The Attorney General resumed
his official duties to-day. Among
the callers were ex-U. S. Senator
Paine, and U. S. Attorney Wells, of
Miss. A lengthy conversation re-
sulted, in the course of which the
delegation assured the Attorney
General that they would support
the policy of the administration, as
indicated by him, would be disas-
trous to the state interests, and
especially would it be a disaster
to the people of the state, if the
general government, the result
would be the redemption of the
State from many serious difficulties
now existing, not among the least
of which would be the election of a
patriotic and law-abiding legisla-
ture.

Ten Years in the Penitentiary.
BOSTON, 9.—John Grew, one of
the Jefferson-Brown crew, who was
accused on the charge of murder,
to-day, sentenced by Judge
Lowell to ten years in the state
prison on his plea of guilty of mu-
ltry.

CANADA.
A Swindler Arrested.

QUEBEC, 9.—A man named H. P.
Adams, of New York, was arrested
yesterday, while endeavoring to
pass a forged draft for four thousand
dollars on the Bank of British

North America, since his arrest he
has confessed that he is one of an
organized gang of swindlers who
had decided upon making simul-
taneous presentations of forged
credit wherever such paper was
accepted.

Swindled.
HALIFAX, 9.—The Bank of British
North America was, yesterday,
swindled out of \$2,700, by a man
who registered his name at the
hotel, as B. A. Bell, of New York,
on a forged letter of credit, pur-
porting to have been issued at the
New York agency; the man is sup-
posed to be the same party that
was arrested to-day in New Brun-
swick, for an attempt to obtain
money on the same forged letter.

Heavy Damages Recovered.
OTTAWA, Ont., 9.—In the case of
Edwards vs. the Ottawa River
Navigation Co. for the destruction
of mills at Rockland, last summer,
by sparks from a steamer, the jury
gave plaintiff a verdict of \$216,000.
