**New Power Proposition**—Application was filed yesterday afternoon, with the office of the state engineer for 615 acre feet of water from North Dry creek in Salt Lake county, just south of Little Cottonwood canyon. The work will require four dams, containing respectively, 174, 160, 130, and 150 acre feet of water. The plan is to be 3,000 horse power, the object being to supply neighboring mining camps with electric lighting and power.

**POLITICS IN DENVER.**

Where Public Service Corporations Rule and Ignore Party Organizations.

Salt Lake politics may be as sober as a Sunday school, but they are bleached as compared with Denver politics, according to the statements today of an old timer from the Queen city. "There is a combination here," he says, "including the City Water Works company, the Denver Tramway, the Electric Light company, and one or two other public utilities corporations. This outfit has no politics, like the nation interest, beyond its own aggrandizement. Sometimes it affiliates with the Democrats, sometimes with the Republicans, as best suits its purpose, and it has its grip so firmly on the reins of the local body politic, that hardly any political storm of an earthquake can shake it off. Denver is really a Republican city, and Colorado a Republican state; yet it is complete in the control of this gang that it was able to send the election to the legislature of a sufficient number of Democrats to insure the return to the United States senate of Gen. C. J. Hughes, a Democrat, to succeed Henry M. Teller, a Republican. No one can hope to hold office in Denver without the O. K. of this gang, and the public is held up and bled according to the sweet will of this combination. However, there was one election in the election of public officers, viz., that of Judge Lindsey, the juvenile judge. The best women of Denver took their automobiles and went through the city, and the shops of Denver prior to the last election, and pledged all the hands to vote for the judge, as against the ring candidate, and Lindsey won, in spite of all the gang could do to defeat him."

Seriously injured but not fatally, Frank O'RILEY, a real estate dealer who resides at 1775 south Third East street, lies at the Holy Cross hospital as the result of being run over by an automobile driven by Miss Nellie Nelson, 218 South State street, shortly before 6 o'clock Tuesday night. The young lady driver is prostrated at her home because of the accident. Mrs. P. H. Bogler, of S. J. Adams, and Mrs. J. H. Lester, of 223 east Eighth South, and Mrs. Harry Adams of 22 west First South, were also victims, but escaped with minor injuries.

The accident occurred at Main and Third South. The machine, which contained besides Miss Nelson a 3-year-old son of Joseph Nelson, owner of the car and uncle of Miss Nelson, two other women, was being driven south on the west side of Main. In some way the driver lost control and it crashed into the curb directly at the corner. Here all of the injured were standing and were unable to get out of the way. O'RILEY was knocked down and both legs were run over. Mrs. Bogler and Mrs. Lester were hurled to their homes suffering from slight bruises and severe fright.
