Their Contracts. The Boston Financial News says:

"Copper and brass manufacuring cor-porations which consume the aggregate of \$17,5000,000 lbs of copper per annum state that they have much more busiss on the books than was the case a ar ago. Most of the large copper and brass

mills in New England could operate full time to July on contracts on hand. In normal times these plants never have on hand business for more than S0 days' running.

S0 days' running. In wire and wire products, electrical fittings and the general lines of copper and brass manufactures for the engi-neering trade factories are from 60 to 100 days behind the usual periods be-tween the booking and the execution of contracts." of contracts."

It was the management's intention to prospect a fissure about 900 feet from the shaft in said drift, but on account of a lack of fuel during the last three months, work had to be suspended from the drift. We also run a drift to the south from the 500-foot level, a dis-tance of about 200 feet through very hard lime, where a north and south yein about 300 feet east of the said shaft was cut. We found what seems to be large bodies of zinc ores, upshaft was cut. In prospecting the lower grado mill ores above the 400-foot level with upraises, we encountered shoots of ship-ping ore which extended, in some places, to the 300-foot level above, and we now have an almost continuous shipping ore body on this fissure going upward from the 400-foot level and fully 300 feet long. "The same ore having been cut on the 300-foot level, where it has been explored, and is still being explored for fully 300 feet along the fissure on that level; that these ores were found on upraising from the 400-foot level; that at one place, especially, is at-tention railed to at this time be-cause of the size and quality of the lead ore. The last four cars settled for fram that stope helted your com-pany more than 34,200; with six or eight more cars most of which is from that same stope, at the sampler or on the way. There being no work done thus far to the east, we are unable to say how far above the 300-foot level this ore continues, but as the ore is go-ing up strong the probabilities are that it will continue toward the surface for some distance, at least.
