The Trouble Between Deputy Marshals and Sheriff at Timie.

BIG REDUCTION WORKS BURNED.

Urgent Land Sprints—Description of the Bob Boy—Guns.

Rising Prices.

The U. S. deputy marshals who were run off by sheriff Mattivian and his posse with shotgun and rifles at Timie have returned to this city. They have little to communicate on the subject, regarding it as an official secret. But when a statement of the occurrence was made to him, Deputy Bush replied "That's just what they did."

The racket occurred on Saturday, at the Utah Mining company's plant, twelve miles west of Eureka. On Friday, under attachment issued by the justice of the peace, Sheriff Mattivian of Juab county, and his deputy, W. L. Scott, attached the mill for claims aggregating \$10,000, made by the employees. A man was left in charge, and when Deputy Cannon, Bush and Cassidy came to take possession of the mill on an attachment behalf of the Utah Loan and Building association, the workmen joined with the sheriff's men and the deputies were not permitted to complete their intended proceedings.

Deputy Cannon started in Silver City to communicate with Marshal Brigham, and Deputies Bush and Cassidy succeeded in getting into the mill. The sheriff had been uncooperative with, and came down and arrested Bush and Cassidy, who were taken to Eureka and released on their own recognizance.

In the meantime the sheriff and many工作men, armed with shotgun and rifles, are holding the mill. Just what action the marshals will take in the present emergency is not known. It is necessary of course, that something be done in this instance, not decided upon as yet, but the premises is under attack and nothing will be done quickly, and the sheriff has not heard the last of the miners by any means. The sheriff on his part says he is legally in possession of the property and will hold it.

OUTLINE'S PLANT BURNED.
Outline's plant at Piney, which has been removed from Piney, at noon yesterday (Sunday) at about the great Bullionville Reduction Works, twelve miles from Piney, were turned to the ground. The loss amounts to over \$200,000, insurance aside, plus the cost of salinity, the loss will be \$300,000. The plant is situated with admirable energy for years to make a success of the great enterprise for working the immense deposit of tailings at Bullionville. He had just reached a point where his efforts were meeting with success when the disaster occurred.

BULLION-RECK CLOSED.
The Bullion-Reck mine was closed down this morning for the fourth time. The holder for the month will last a week. Major H. C. Miller said today "Unless something happens in the meantime to cause a change in our policy, work will be resumed on Monday morning next with the usual force of men. We will not shut down the mine if we can help it."

THE ROD BOY.

GENERAL CORRESPONDENCE OF THE NEWS.
BUCKEY, UTAH, July 27, 1865.—Leaving the Bay Bee mine and passing down the gulch about 400 yards the trail or canyon Indian Creek is left following a stream bed with cottonwood, willow and alder, and on the sloping and abrupt hills through which it meanders for miles scrub oak and mountain maple are prominent. Turning suddenly to the right at the junction of the stream with the creek, the prospect is striking with the large ledge of quartz that class abruptly out of the hill on the north side of the stream, to a height of thirty to forty feet, and from one hundred and fifty to two hundred feet long east and west. The top of the ledge is near the south west end of the claim. The ledge from the discovery monument is now being developed to this point.

Putting up our team, we crossed the creek to where the company is excavating a stamp quarry mill. Here we took a walk around the camp. The mill of Bullionville and Piney, which in 1858 to 1872, was actively engaged in the construction and removal of quartz mills at Bullionville, and is now superintending the construction here. Up along the creek we went.

We were referred to Mr. Jessen, in charge of the mill, who stated at first, but after telling the gentleman that our visit was to inspect the news, he kindly took us along.

Arriving at the discovery point, Mr. Orwin took out the section of the document and read: "Sept. 18th, 1862. Answered." Said he, "Right there in the creek," pointing to the uppermost large quartzoulder that Fred (Mr. White) had discovered. Used to say he was the first to find it, but the miners from the south to the north side. When the water would get low and the sun would strike the rock, it would glisten so brightly that one day he got a pick, broke off a piece about as big as his hand, and said enough was that he had a valuable find. He said good that you could discern it with the naked eye."

A climb up the hill for about twenty-five feet brought us to the mouth of the first tunnel, where we were confronted by a large wall of rock, which was about three feet thick and \$14,000 per ton. The ledge had been stripped on the surface for 100 feet east and west. Looking up and down the hill the blisters or iron pyrites and chalcocite that it runs horizontally through the rock, all the month of this tunnel is left standing (to be broken up and extracted when the mill is completed) a large quartzoulder, or block of rock, that will weigh 100 tons, and from the several pieces have been broken off and sold.

Going Mr. Orwin further for an example of ore on the slopes, he said: "That pile down there is all

of a hundred tons, but in the left is three hundred, and this in front of us is four hundred, so you can see we have to strip them to get them out of the mill, that will go from \$200 to \$300."

Entering the tunnel, we passed through a drift very featureless, showing high grade ore all the way. At the end of the tunnel a platform is provided for another drift, ten feet wide, which is turned to the west of the creek, leaving the prospect open. At the end of the first drift, just above a double compartment, incloses shafts, stairs, tools, etc. At the end a drift leading out with shafts and stairs, which will be used to load the company's cars, so that when the company has already loaded the surface, a drift 45 feet on the fifty foot level, there are force doors in the mine, and fifteen cars will be used to haul the mine's operations at the mine. The mine is to close during the winter months, and the company has appointed a receiver under bonds in the sum of \$200. The receiver is bounded in the usual manner.

BRICKLAYERS QUIT WORK.

For Three Weeks They Worked at the Joint City and County Building.

The bricklayers employed at the joint city and county building refused to go to work this morning. As a result there is considerable worry on the part of mechanical and civil officers. The city has received no appropriation at the meeting on Friday night in favor of the workmen, and the contractors will not pay the men until the work is done.

Always as high as six inches in diameter have been made at Bell, Lick, Silver Head and Union, from the blocks which are thickly decked with black sulphurite.

The adobe walls for several houses have been prepared in places the lower story, and the first floor.

When ready to lay, the adobe will be laid by the company nearly \$10,000. It was purchased at \$1000, Nevada, and loaded from there to Las Vegas.

The mill is being erected near the town of Eureka, and the two trusses are in place, and the main beam from the west end and southern parts of the bridge connecting them each right in the mill for crooking and rearing. The company are now preparing to complete the mill when the weather is favorable, and the workmen are now engaged in working the tailings from Indian Creek, Las, and hundred mile brooks, to run a Pelton wheel.

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
