DEPEW'S ELECTION OVER FRANK BLACK

Odell Says it Was President Who Persuaded Him to Come Out for Latter.

HE WENT TO WASHINGTON.

Charge that it Was Use of Roosevelt's Influence that Subsequently Led To Black's Downfall.

New York, Dec. 21,-Former Gov. Odell. in the course of an interview tonight, asserted that it was President Roosevelt who persuaded him to come out for ex-Gov. Frank S. Black for United States senator to succeed Chauncey M. Depew, and that it was the use of the president's influence subsequently that led to Black's downfall. "I went to Washington," said Mr. Odell, "to see the president und have a talk with him about the New York political situation, which we had in the fall of 1904. The question of the senatorship came up and the president said it was a pity to have the state of New York represented by two almost senile old men. 'New York,' he said, 'ought to have some man to speak for it on the floor of the senate who would command attention and reflect credit on the state.' He said that ex-Gov. I asked him it was to inter from his remarks that he would like to

from his remarks that he would like to see Gov. Black elected to succeed Depew. He said he would.

"Then you wish me to be for Black." I asked.

"I hope you will be, he replied.
"I told him that I would. I came back to New York, saw Gov. Higgins and told him what the president had said, and Higgins indorsed it all.

"We were making great headway, when Senator Platt called a conference in the interest of Depew. That conference was practically dominated by friends of the president and the governor. The leading federal officeholders of New York were there, and all declared for Depew, as against Black. I was amazed. While I convinced myself that the president and the governor were not willing to stand the governor were not willing to stand for the proposition which each of them had asked me to carry out. HIGGINS MAKES REPLY. Albany, N. Y., Dec. 21.—Gov. Higgins tonight replied in part to the statement made in New York today by former Gov. B. B. Odell, Jr., chairman of the Republican state committee, in reference to the governor's action. action in proposing Assemblyman James W. Wadsworth of Livingston county, for speaker of the assembly.
The governor's statement was made verbally, but dictated with more than ordinary care and deliberation to the group of newspaper correspondents. He

"I have read the statement of Gov. Odell sent out this afternoon from New York and published in the evening papers in which he states that I said I would not be for any candidate for speaker of the assembly from either of the large cities of the state. I think he must have forgotten our last conference in New York last Friday.
"Previous to my going to New York I had learned, through geveral members of the assembly that called on me, that Gov. Odell was using my name for the purpose of securing pledges for Mr. Merritt for speaker. I asked him by what authority he was using my name. He told me he thought at a conference a month previous, he said to me that Mr. Merritt was the proper man for the position. I then asked him if he would agree upon any other candidate—any Mr. Merritt was the proper man for the position. I then asked him if he would agree upon any other candidate—any man in the legislature. He told me he would not; that he was pledged to Mr. Merritt, and Mr. Merritt would not withdraw, I do not eare to discuss with Gov. Odell through the press questions of honesty or dishonesty.

"So far as the future of the Republican party is concerned, I think that I can safely be trusted with the press and the people as to whether my action is wise or unwise."

WHAT PRESIDENT SAID.

Old Westbury, L. I., Dec. 21.—Congressman Cocks of the president's own congressional district, on his return from Washington, stated here today that he had called at the White House to consult with the president as to the attitude of the assemblyman from Nassau county about the speakership contest. The president said that as a citizen of Nassau and a constituent of the assemblyman, if his advice was asked, he would state that in his opinion Mr. Wadsworth was an ideal candidate for speaker; that it would be the best possible thing both for the party and the state if he were elected; that he possessed the very qualities most needed in the speakership at this particular juncture; that not only was he a man of ability, of unflinching courage and ruggedly aggressive honesty, but his election would mean that the Republicans would have a speaker WHAT PRESIDENT SAID. esty, but his election would mean that the Republicans would have a speaker absolutely free from dictation by any individual or by any ring, a man who would be entirely his own master and incapable of being coerced by any interest, political or financial, and that it would indeed be a fortunate thing if Mr. Wadsworth was elected, for he is a man of the Herbert Parsons type; that is the type of man that the plain that is the type of man that the plain people who compose the great bulk of the Republican party wish to see high in the party management.

VIEWS OF MINORITY ON PHILIPPINE TARIFF BILL.

Washington, Dec. 21.—The view of the minority members of the ways and means committee on the Philippine tariff bill were filed in the house today by Representative John Sharp Williams of Mississippi, the Democratic floor leader. The Democratic offer a substitute declaring for absolute free trade between the Philippines and the United States, including Hawaii and Porto Rico, but add that if their substitute in voted down than if their substitute is voted down they will support the Republican bill as it is "a long step in the logical and right direction." The report says:

"The members of the minority of

committee on ways and means believe that the anomalous and preposterous status of the Philippine islands by which they are treated as an Ameri-can territory for certain other pur-poses, cannot long be maintained, and should be immediately terminated.

"At present, according to the whim of Congress or the executive, they are considered as American or foreign, or as both American and foreign, or as neither American nor foreign.
"In justice to both the Filipinos and ourselves they should be considered as

altogether American or altogether for-

"So long as we retain them we favor the establishment and maintenance of free trade between them and the

free trade between them and the United States,
"The party which we in part represent desires to get rid of them at the cartiest practicable moment and we welcome the dissatisfaction of the hitherto legislative favored classes, growing out of the competition of the products of Philippine labor with our own products in our own market as a own products in our own market as a possible moving cause to governmental divorce between the Philippine archipelago and balance, of the United States."
