Distinguished Visitor Spoke in Norwegian-Audience Was Composed Mostly of Scandinavian People.

Erling Bjornsen delivered an interesting lecture last evening, in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium on Norway and its condition. He said that King Oscar had promised to live in Norway part of each year, but negelcted to keep his promise, which was the main factor in the separation of the dual kingdom. Democratic Sweden was in sympathy with Norway, but with no voice in the government, it could extend no aid. The lecturer spoke in Norwegian, and the audience was composed almost entirely of Scandinavian people.

JUDGE NIELSEN PRESIDED.

Judge Nielsen presided and introduced the lecturer, remarking in doing so: "Nothing is dearer to a man or a people than the word home. We, the Norwegian people call Norway home in the sense that the absent son or daugh ter speaks of the old homestead and Yet we have come here sworn allegiance to the Stars and Stripes, and desire to be loyal to our new obligations. But we love our fa-theriand and are glad to greet the noble representative who has come to us from our beloved fjelds and fjords. I conhonor to present to the speaker of the evening, Mr. Erling Bjørnsen.

The lecturer was warmly welcomed. and prefaced his lecture by calling at tention to the fact that Norway the oldest organized kingdom in Eu-rope, Rebellious conduct was the cause of the downfall of the people, and they finally were brought under Swedish rule in 1368. The speaker continued:

### FATE OF NORWAY.

"In the Napoleonic pot was also the fate of Norway stirred. Norway was given to Sweden in consolation for the loss of Finland; given to Sweden with-out the consent of the people, who at the time were entirely ignorant of the transaction. The Danish king, Frederick VII, in his letter to the Norweglan people, said he was sorry to have them separated from the alliance, for they had proven his most loyal subjects. He hoped they would prove as loyal to their new king.

"And the people were loyal to the kings who were loyal to them. Contention gradually arose. The Norweg-ians wanted more freedom and finwere given their own constitution. Something of very great im-portance was forgotten or left out. however, the question of the consular service. Norway had to be satisfied service. in being represented by the Swedish consuls. Out of this grew the final separation of the two countries.

"In 1905 the Norwegians were ready to demand their rights. Their fortifications along the frontier were manned and mounted with field-pieces. Having studied the plans and successful op-

TRUST BURDENED.

In an interview, the noted lecturer characterized the American people as trust burdened; some have too much money and many not enough. In Nor-way the people are none too rich, but they are comfortable, "When Ameri-cans get wealthy they often become ashamed of their parents; we love our ashamed of their parents: we love our parents and hold in reverence the mem-ory of our forefathers." Mr. Bjorn-sen said that great harm was being worked by the desire for wealth. De-falcations are one of the results. He believed in progress but this fast pace so characteristic of American life be-gets evils. The visitors said he believ-ed in public ownership of public utili-tics and the railwars should be owntics, and the railways should be own-ed or managed by the government. The plan works well in Europe. While wages may be low in Norway, there is not the difference between the cost of living and wages that obtains in this country. Professional men in Norway receive high salaries, and the working man receives enough to live comfortably on. In Norway cultured women are held in high esteem, and the fact that they may not have money does not count. It is different in the United States, Mr. Bjornsen said, where wealth is bowed down to and worship-

In referring to American politics, Mr. Bjornsen did not think that a man should be a policeman, or a janitor be-cause of his politics, but because of his personal fitness for the position to which he is appointed. The visitor said he had just receiv-

ed a letter from his distinguished fails-er in which the latter stated he had written a song advocating the right of vomen to vote on state questions. Mr. Bjørnsen will speak next Friday
