WANTS DAMAGES FOR ALIENATION.

Mrs. Frances' P. Stimpson De mands \$40,000 From Miss Grace D. Davis

FOR STEALING HER HUSBAND

Latter Has Been Paying Attention to Young Woman and Deserted His Family.

Miss Grace D. Davis has been made defendant in a \$40,000 damage suit filed in the district court by Mrs. Frances P. Stimpson, who alleges that the young lady "wrongfully and wickedly" alienated the affections of her husband, Warren E. Stimpson. The complaint

Warren E. Stimpson. The complaint alleges that plaintiff and Stimpson ware married on June 21, 1894, and that they lived together until March 8, 1906, when he left her and their three children. She alleges that her husband commenced paying attention to Miss Davis in about December, 1903.

The complaint further alleges that "the defendant, will knowing that said Warren E. Stimpson was the husband of the plaintiff, wrongfully, wickedly and unjustly besought, persuaded and allured the said Warren E. Stimpson to withdraw his affection from said plaintiff, and to cease living with and supporting her, to insult, traduce and mailgn her and to compel her to support herself and the three children of port herself and the three children of plaintiff, and to wholly desert and abandon her."

Because of the actions of defendant Mrs. Filmpson asks judgment for \$40,-000. Finintiff resides at 14 Wiljard court. At present Miss Davis is in Bos-ton, but she is expected to return next

20TH WARD CO-OP. WINS.

Action of Judge Tanner Regarding Cer tain Judgment is Annulled.

A decree was rendered in favor of plaintiff today by Judge Morse in the case of the Twentieth Ward Co-operative Mercantile Institution against H. S. Tanner, former judge of the city court, and Frank Dayl, in which it was ordered that the action of Judge Tan-ner in setting aside a judgment se-cured in a justice court by plaintiff against Davi be annulled and that the order be vacated.

The judgment was secured in Justice Lochrie's court on March 27, 1991, for the sum of \$52,15. On July 5, 1994, Judge Tanner, upon motion of the attorneys for Davi, ordered the judgment set aside and recalled the execution which had been issued in the case. It was contended by the plaintiff in this action that the court exceeded its jurisdiction in setting aside the judgment as the law provides that a judgment can not be set aside otherwise than on motion for a new trial made within 19 days after the entry of the judgment. In this case the judgment was not set aside until over three years after its entry. Judge Morse holds that Judge Tanner exceeded his jurisdiction and hence rendered a decree annulling his
