

BOARD OF PARDONS IN SESSION TODAY

Has a Batch of Applications for
Commutation Under
Consideration

OTHERS WANT FULL PARDON.

Case of Merrill M. Kaigha, Convicted
Of Manslaughter, Receives
Attention.

The state board of pardons held its regular monthly meeting today and considered the following applications for pardon, commutation and parole:

FOR PARDON.
Gus Smith, attempt of highway robbery, convicted in Second district court, Weber county, sentenced Oct. 24, 1903, by Hon. H. H. Rolapp to five years in state prison.

Marry Pool, robbery, convicted in Third district court, Salt Lake county, sentenced Dec. 15, 1903, by Hon. Jacob Johnson to eight years in state prison.

William Brown, housebreaking, convicted in Third district court, Salt Lake county, sentenced Dec. 16, 1904, by Hon. T. D. Lewis, to 19 months in state prison.

John T. Isdale, fornication, convicted in First district court, Cache county, sentenced Nov. 18, 1903, to one year in state prison by Hon. C. H. Hart, presiding.

Wade Nichols, murder in second degree, convicted in Second district court, Beaver county, and sentenced to 25 years in penitentiary.

Zin Graham, grand larceny, convicted in Third district court, Salt Lake county, sentenced July 14, 1902, by Hon. C. W. Morse to four years in state prison.

Joseph Earl Wilkinson, carnal knowledge of female under age of consent, convicted in Sixth district court, Sevier county, sentenced Sept. 28, 1904, by Hon. J. P. Childster to two years in state prison.

HAWORTH CASE UP.
The application for pardon of Nick Haworth, who was convicted of murder and sentenced to death, but whose sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment, was under consideration the greater part of the day. Attorney A. J. Weber appeared for Haworth and presented quite a forcible argument. The matter will be considered in executive session late this afternoon.

LOOKS GOOD FOR DUKE.
It is thought highly probable that the application for pardon of Harry T. Duke, sentenced to four years for embezzlement, will be favorably acted upon, as Mr. Duke's sentence expires on Monday.

Three Unhappy Couples Released From Matrimonial Obligations.

Judge Morse had a busy time yesterday afternoon when he called his regular divorce calendar, three decrees of divorce being rendered. Jennie Young was divorced from Joseph H. Young on the grounds of desertion and non-support. They were married at Logan on Feb. 25, 1887, and have six children, the custody of whom was awarded to plaintiff.

Fred B. Brooks was granted a divorce from Barbara E. Brooks on the ground of infidelity. They were married in this city on Dec. 26, 1899. Plaintiff was awarded the custody of their two children.

Failure to support is the ground upon which the court awarded a decree. M. Bush a divorce from Joseph Bush.

WANTS DAMAGES FOR ALIENATION.

Mrs. Frances P. Stimpson De-
mands \$40,000 From Miss
Grace D. Davis

FOR STEALING HER HUSBAND

Latter Has Been Paying Attention to
Young Woman and Deserted
His Family.

Miss Grace D. Davis has been made defendant in a \$40,000 damage suit filed in the district court by Mrs. Frances P. Stimpson, who alleges that the young lady "wrongfully and wickedly" alienated the affections of her husband, Warren E. Stimpson. The complaint alleges that plaintiff and Stimpson were married on June 21, 1904, and that they lived together until March 8, 1905, when he left her and their three children. She alleges that her husband commenced paying attention to Miss Davis in about December, 1903.

Because of the actions of defendant Mrs. Stimpson asks judgment for \$40,000. Plaintiff resides at 14 Willard court. At present Miss Davis is in Boston, but she is expected to return next week.

20TH WARD CO-OP. WINS.
Action of Judge Tanner Regarding Certain Judgment is Annulled.

A decree was rendered in favor of plaintiff today by Judge Morse in the case of the Twentieth Ward Co-operative Mercantile Institution against H. S. Tanner, former judge of the city court, and Frank Davis, in which it was ordered that the action of Judge Tanner in setting aside a judgment secured in a justice court by plaintiff against Davis be annulled and that the order be vacated.

The judgment was secured in Justice Leach's court on March 27, 1904, for the sum of \$52.15. On July 5, 1904, Judge Tanner, upon motion of the attorneys for Davis, ordered the judgment set aside and recalled the execution which had been issued in the case. It was contended by the plaintiff in this action that the court exceeded its jurisdiction in setting aside the judgment, as the law provides that a judgment can not be set aside otherwise than on motion for a new trial made within 10 days after the entry of the judgment. In this case the judgment was not set aside until over three years after its entry. Judge Morse holds that Judge Tanner exceeded his jurisdiction and hence rendered a decree annulling his acts.
