

TELEGRAPHIC. DESIRE FOR PEACE.

The Hellespont Enthusiasm of the Greeks Has Vanished.

EFFECT OF THE LOSS OF LARISSA.

Greeks Withdraw from Spina—Concessions of Larissa—Wholesale Massacre by Muhammadans.

LONDON, May 7.—The Athens correspondent of the Times says: The news of the retreat from Pharsala was at first received with consternation, but the public has already accepted the situation, and now regards the retreat to Demetrias as a strategic movement dictated by prudence. It is generally felt that Gen. Miaoulis's defense of Velestino has vindicated the reputation of the Greek army and wiped out the disgrace of Mani and Larissa.

THE POSITION OF THE ROYAL FAMILY.

LONDON, May 7.—The Home correspondence of the Daily Mail, under date of yesterday, cables the state department that telegram has been received from Constantinople stating that the royal family have left the palace, and have fled to the mountains.

GREENS BROKEN DOWN.

CORINTH, May 7.—The Athens correspondent of the Bulletin reports that he has interviewed an aide-de-camp of King George, who says: "Since the loss of Larissa the Greeks have totally broken down. They have no equipment, neither food nor tents. They have to sleep in the open air, and the night is a Greek Calvary even a trifling success she will see for peace."

SITUATION IN BULGARIA.

LONDON, May 7.—A dispatch to the Daily Chronicle from Paris says that the Greeks have now withdrawn from Epirus, the last having crossed the river into Albania on Monday. Air is being put in a state of defense, and the Turks are awaiting the arrival of the army before moving.

COLONIA, May 7.—A dispatch to the London Standard from Cape Town says that the British government has authorized the Italian torpedo boat for Greece.

EMBROIDERED WOUNDERS AND SCYTHIAN SWORDS.

LONDON, May 7.—A dispatch from Constantinople, via Larissa, says: "During Wednesday's battle our losses were heavy, but it is impossible to exaggerate the strategic and moral importance of the Turkish victory. Our soldiers were hunting for ambulances, which are almost a military necessity, the men in our hospitals. It is reported that the Greeks intended to retreat to the interior, but the Turkish army was too strong for them. The houses had been strengthened by means of turf and were loop-holed for sniping."

MASSACRE OF CHRISTIANS.

LONDON, May 7.—A dispatch to the Chicago Tribune from Athens says: "Our Massacre news from Asia that the Turks have begun a wholesale massacre of the inhabitants in the interior of Epirus. Almost all the inhabitants of the village of Kalamas have been murdered. A few only escaped to the mountains. From other parts women are arriving at Arta in the most wretched condition, bearing atrocious scars."
