Reviett introduced an ordinance which is intended to decrease the dan-ger of street car accidents, which have been rather numerous of late. The or-dinance, which follows in full, was read and referred to the municipal laws committee: "Section 1.-Any person who shall at-

tempt to enter into or upon any street car in this city while the same is in motion by passing under, over or through any railing, screen, chain or other device maintained upon such car for the purpose of preventing accident to passengers, and any person who shall enter or remain upon the plat-form, step or running board of any street car while the same is in motion with the intention of riding or remain-ing upon the outside of any such railing screen, chain or other device or with the intention of removing or inerfering with the same shall be guilty of an offence.

"See, 2.—Any minor under age of 18 years who shall climb, jump upon, cling to or in any way attach himself. or herself to any horse or electric can of any kinl while the same is in motion shall be guilty of an offense. "Sec. 3.-Any person who shall violate

the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not exceeding the sum of \$10." WOULD EXCHANGE LOTS. caped

THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE. Mr. Cleveland Declares it to be Revision of the Tariff.

New York, Oct. 28 .- The Herald prints a dispatch from Trenton, N. J., in which former President Cleveland is quoted as saying:

"I feel very much interested in my party this year, but do not want to take an active and prominent part in the struggle. I consented with reluc-tance to make a speech at Morristown on next Thursday, because the circumstances were reported to me as being exceptional, and it was thought that I

could do some good. "But the fact that I consented has gone out, and has brought down on me an avalanche of applications for me to make speeches or to write letters or otherwise get into the fight. This I cannot do. There are other Democrats who are coming forward and I am quite

content to stay in retirement and en-joy the repose of home life." "It is generally felt," Mr. Cleveland added, "that the Democratic party stands on solid ground this year in unequivocally declaring for a revision of the tariff. But then, everybody knows where I stand on that question. It is now and will be, until equitable settled, the paramount issue in American polltes.'

New York, Oct. 28.-In consequence t the discontinuance of the government subsidy, says a dispatch from Ddessa, by way of London to the Times, the Black Sea and Danube Steamship company has decided to sell its entire fleet of 12 ships. No dividend has been paid since the formation of the com-
