A Resolution authorizing the Mayor of Salt Lake City to tender to the Government of the United States certain lands upon which to erect government buildings, and to execute a deal therefor upon certain conditions: WHEREAS, there is a necessity in Salt Lake City for SUITABLE GOVERNMENT buildings, for the transaction of the busi-ness of the Federal Government with the cutzens of Salt Lake City, and of Utah Tercitizens of Salt Lake City, and of Utah Ter-ritory, and Whereas the corporation of Salt Lake City is desirous that these buildings may be erected for the convenience and accommo-dation of the citizens and the general im-provement of the city; and realizing that permanent buildings for government pur-poses should be built upon the most eligible location obtainable, therefore, Be it resolved by the City Council of Salt Lake City that the mayor of said city be and
