THE NEW PRECINCTS.

Late Monday afternoon the board of county commissioners divided Balt Lake City into fifty-two voting districts and the country, outside of the city, into thirty-five precinct, or eighty-seven in all, where formerly there were only thirty-two precincts. This is done in accordance with the provisions of the new law, which requires that each voting district or preoinct shall enntain not more than 800 voters. The county commissioners, in pursuance of the law, will also appoint one registry agent for each district who shall be a member of the dominant party in the district. It is required that the chairman of the district committee of the dominant party shall submit the names of three members of the party to the commissioners, who will select one to act as registration agent in the district. There are as yet no committees in the new voting districts but it is auggested that the parties make an early election of the same so that the board may have the necessary names submitted as soon as possible.
