## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Miner Breaks Leg.**—Ed Anderson, a miner aged 19, broke his leg yesterday at the Mavor con. mine, and was brought to St. Mark's hospital in the afternoon.

**Died at County Infirmary.**—Samuel Inhoff, aged 72, who came to Utah with Johnston's army, died at the county infirmary Saturday evening, of pneumonia incident to his time of life. He was discharged from government service while at Camp Floyd, and followed the occupation of a thinker.

**Knocked Down by Auto.**—Michael Powers, a miner 50 years old, was knocked down and badly hurt by an automobile at Third South and Main street Saturday afternoon. The driver, Carl Larson, was arrested by Patrolman Clough on the charge of violating the speed ordinance.

**Level of Utah Lake.**—Utah lake is now 15 feet below compromise point, with the five pumps running for the past two months. If there is no precipitation to speak of this winter, it is claimed that the lake level will be reduced five feet before another irrigation season is finished. This will not leave much of the lake.

**Work on New Plant.**—The Utah Light & Railway company is pushing construction in Echo Canyon, as far as possible, before snow flies. There are now 160 men and 30 teams at work, exclusive of the corps of engineers, laying 5,500 feet of pipe for the new plant. General Manager J. S. Wells has returned from a visit to the scene of operations fully satisfied with the progress made.

**Water in Big Ditch Nov. 1.**—The Irrigated Lands company has started construction on the old Mammoth reservoir, east of Fairview, where it will have shortly 100 teams and men, and 40 Japs at work. The company is expending \$200,000, with a view to reclaiming 15,000 acres of land. There will be water in the ditch at Price by Nov. 1, at the very latest. There are 15 cars of cement in transit from Portland, Ore.

**William Bell Arrested.**—William Bell, wanted at Provo City, Ore., was arrested in Ogden Saturday afternoon by Detective Joe Burt of this city. The man is wanted on the charge of forgery. It is claimed that he swindled a young woman out of \$1,000. He came to Salt Lake, where he was caught, tried to find him, they learned that he had gone to Ogden. Detective Burt went to the Junction City State day afternoon, and soon located the man and placed him under arrest. He will be returned to Oregon.

**Stolen Bicycle Found.**—Saturday afternoon Henry Shutter, a motorman on the Murray line saw a young man on Fourteenth South street throw a bicycle into a ditch. He picked it up and carried it to the police station. At Murray the youth jumped from the car and disappeared into some brush. The return trip was made by the police headquarters, where it was identified as the wheel stolen from F. E. Morrill several days ago.

**"Dynamite Dan" Jailed.**—Dan Campbell, known as "Dynamite Dan," was arrested by Patrolman Burton yesterday afternoon on the charge of petit larceny. A boy working for the Salt Lake Transfer company, who gave a \$1 bill by manager Kimball to get changed, "Dynamite Dan" saw the boy with the money and took it. He was getting pretty well filled with whiskey when Patrolman Burton placed him under arrest. Of the \$10, only \$4 was recovered.

**Predicts Prosperity.**—Manager Burton of the Utah Implement-Vehicle company has returned from an extended business trip through the mid-west. He found the trade generally in good condition, and was told that the untoward effects of laying off so many hands on account of the automobile trade taking care of so many of the implement factory mechanics who otherwise would have remained idle. Mr. Burton thanks for a prosperous season next year.

**Dog Causes Alarm.**—A dog left alone in the home of William Birkinshaw, 337 East Fifth South street last night, caused an alarm to be rung. The robbers were looking for the house. Residents saw a suspicious looking character prowling about the neighborhood and when they heard the dog barking furiously, they thought a robbery was in the house. The police were notified and several bluecoats hurried to the Birkinshaw home in the patrol wagon. They did not find a robber, but found a dog anxious to get out of the house.

# UNIVERSITY READY TO OPEN

Expected That One Thousand Students Will Be Enrolled By Monday Next.

## BUREAU TO BE ESTABLISHED

So That Those Who Cannot Afford to Take Studies May Be Supplied With Light Employment.

The faculty of the state university announces that that institution will open for instruction September 14, and it is expected that 1,000 college students will register. Of the 1,172 students last year fully two-thirds were of the college grade. This good showing goes in evidence that the state university is gradually assuming the characteristics of the older universities and especially so as the current catalogue shows that four foreign countries and 25 states outside of Utah are represented in the university attendance. Admissions will be held Sept. 9, and 10; registration of students will be on September 11 and 12.

## MAKING PREPARATIONS.

The students of the university are making active preparations for the opening of the school year. At the dormitory many reservations have been made and many of the boarding houses near the school are already filled. According to the number of applications for accommodations there will be an exceptionally large number of down-town students enrolled. Those students who are dependent upon themselves to work their way through school are making plans for the winter. Employment is afforded some in assisting the professors and working in the laboratories for which they generally receive 25 cents an hour. The custodian has the giving of a number of additional jobs, such as janitor work, gardening and keeping the school property in repair. It is said that student help will be used in the lunch room this year and a number of students will be employed as trainers for athletes. The sugar plumb of the positions sought after by the students is that of watchman, although it is a responsible position it gives the person an opportunity to put most of his time in studying.

## BUREAU PROPOSITION.

It has been proposed by the alumni association to establish a bureau which will have in charge the distribution of the work around the school and also secure the co-operation of business houses and families for the employment they can furnish. In addition to improvements which have been made upon the campus corresponding improvements have been made on the buildings. The addition which has been made to the gymnasium building will be used for locked rooms, lunch rooms and shower bath rooms, both for the boys and girls. The other buildings on the campus have all been thoroughly renovated.
