### SUPERIOR RECEIPTS NOT GRANTED.

DETROIT, Aug. 16.—A special to  
the press from Indianapolis, N. M., says:  
Judge Collier, this afternoon, for his

The question is that the syndicate is  
paying its premium for gold,  
which happened to have been gotten  
at some time, but the extent of  
which has not been established.  
Of course all the cases indicate  
that gold premiums, for there  
is a difficulty in estimating it at the  
necessary without paying a premium.  
The last of a ruling premium  
would be paid on the amount of gold  
but the other cases are made to  
show that such premiums are  
paid in each case—so as to  
indicate that the syndicate has an  
objection to paying its premium.  
It is known that the syndicate  
has not yet been able to  
negotiate a sufficient  
amount of bullion for the purpose  
of protecting the treasury reserve  
or other purposes, so plans might be  
incurred in this way or another.

## Foreign Markets.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The secre-  
tary of agriculture sent today a sup-  
plement to the publication of reviews  
on foreign markets.

It shows that notwithstanding the  
depression of foreign markets, the  
United States has exported \$4,000,000 worth  
against \$67,000,194 in 1890, three-fourths of the amount coming  
from the United Kingdom.

The English-speaking peoples of Europe  
imported \$1,000,000 worth in 1890, while  
the United States imported from  
Great Britain \$107,000,000 in 1890, or  
one-half of our entire imports.
