This is not the real question. The objection raised by many of the people and taxpayers has been to the irrational and ill-advised methods of applying socalled sanitary rules. The people have thefly objected in this county to the health board banning and discriminat-ing against school children in districts where there is no epidemic and allowing all other classes of people, everywhere, to go unrestrained. This attack on the to go unrestrained. This attack on the schools has not only frightened trustees in most of the districts into excluding healthy children from the schools, but it has included the bringing of doctors and other medical men from Ogden and ther note of the Schools in Infinite. ther parts of the State to Intimidate this county. The people, therefore, of fool all the people all the time, all classes have resented, and do resent,

the right of the health board to exclude their children from school under present conditions and they feel justly grieved that this course of the health board is working such disaster to the welfare of the schools, and they feel, too, that the position that the controversy on the vaccination question has arisen on the merits and demerits of vaccination per hen let the board of health proceed, if they wish. The Governor's besetting fault in this

matter, as it seems to be in some other matters, is that he bases his opinion upon exparte evidence and upon wishes and desires of a few persons.
