

ANNIE BESANT ON SECOND ADVENT

Believes Time is Near When the Savior Will Make Another Personal Visit to Earth.

TO TAKE A BODY FOR EVENT.

May Possibly be That of a Woman, But More Than Likely That Of a Man.

New York, Aug. 3.—Mrs. Annie Besant, head of the Theosophical society, successor of Madame Blavatsky, arrived in this country from her home in India on Saturday, has announced her belief that Christ will soon make another personal visit on earth. She said that the spirit of Christ would manifest itself through the specially fitted physical body of some western person, possibly a woman, but more than likely a man.

During Mrs. Besant's first lecture in this country on this visit, she was asked if Christ was in incarnation now. "He is," she replied, "he is always some body. When he comes next to be known, he will, I think, choose some new body. I may be that this body will have been already trained for some time by another. Christ will inhabit it. Oh yes, he may choose a woman's body and he will come soon. There are signs that the Supreme Teacher will come to earth shortly. Let us hope that he will be allowed to stay among us longer than three years. Maybe some of you think you would not have crucified him in the old Judean days. Try to place yourself in that environment and you will see that you most likely would have been as those who did want to kill him then. "How shall we know him?" you ask. Some of us who feel him now will know him intimately. Others who have not reached that level must cultivate themselves. Never try to justify yourself when accused of anything. Make no defense. Bow your head and let the accusations be made. Be patient, be tolerant, and do not argue. And in time, you will be able to feel his presence intuitively, maybe by the time he comes next again."

preliminary report of the internal revenue bureau, made public today. Whisky tax collections last year were \$134,868,034.48 against \$140,165,807.70 the preceding year. The receipts of beer and other fermented liquors amounted to \$57,456,411.11, a decrease of \$2,551,295, as compared with 1908.

The nation's tobacco bill, however, showed an increase. The government tax on all sorts of tobacco averaged \$21,871,775, an increase of \$2,024,423 over the previous year.

The oleomargarine tax collections were \$902,197, a falling off of \$52,107.

EXPEDITION FOR RELIEF OF PEARY

St. John's, N. F., Aug. 2.—The expedition which will carry relief supplies to Commander Robert E. Peary, who is hunting for the north pole, will leave St. John's tomorrow. The 8-ton schooner Jennie will take 60 tons of coal and the same amount of supplies, which she will land at Etah, Greenland, to supplement the supplies on Peary's schooner, Roosevelt. If Commander Peary is not at Etah, the Jennie will leave as soon as she discharges her cargo, bringing any dispatches Peary may have left. Capt. Samuel Bartlett, who commands the Jennie, is an experienced arctic navigator, and will inquire among the natives if they heard of Frederick A. Cook of Brooklyn, who went north many years ago to look for the pole, and who has been missing for months. If Dr. Cook is at Etah he will be brought down on the schooner.

HOW BRENNER GOT SMILE ON LINCOLN'S FACE

New York, Aug. 3.—Victor D. Brenner, the designer of the new Lincoln penny, 20,000,000 of which are now being circulated by the government, says that he obtained the smile on the "War President's" face by closing his eyes and imagining that Mr. Lincoln was talking to a child. "If you look carefully at the coin, you will see I have made him smiling," said Mr. Brenner. "I wanted to show the sunshine as well as the goodness of his life. I caught this expression only after I had shut my eyes and imagined him speaking to a child."

Mr. Brenner, as a boy, came to this country as a Russian immigrant. After struggling several years at various unremunerative positions, he took up sculpture and has won success.

TO PHOTOGRAPH HAUNTS OF WILD ANIMALS

New York, Aug. 3.—W. E. Boyce, the millionaire Chicago publisher, has just completed final arrangements for the sailing next Wednesday of his expedition which will photograph the haunts of wild animals in East Africa. Mr. Boyce states that these pictures are for the purpose of preserving a likeness of the original landscape and will be furnished to all publications dealing them free of charge.

While Mr. Boyce is in nominal charge of the expedition, the active command will fall upon George R. Lawrence, who has already gained considerable renown for balloon photography. His enormous photograph of the ruins of San Francisco after the earthquake from a balloon brought him into national recognition.

The expedition is taking with it 10 tons of iron filings and many casks of acid with which to make hydrogen gas for the balloons. The sailing of this expedition will follow the trail of the Roosevelt expedition.

FIRE ALARM SENT 200 MILES TO POINT 10 BLOCKS AWAY

St. Louis, Aug. 3.—An alarm of fire for a blaze which originated in the north part of Edwardsville, Ill., yesterday afternoon, was sent over 200 miles in a circuit and returned to point 10 blocks distant in three minutes. About sunset a crew in the lower Washington ward of Edwardsville Junction reported to Agent W. R. Kearney at the station that a car of coal had caught fire.

There is no telephone in the yard station, so Kearney notified the superintendent of the railroad, 100 miles away, by wire. The dispatcher called Peary, the nearest station to Edwardsville, and a long distance telephone. The Peary operator notified the exchange in Edwardsville and the operator there rang the alarm in the engine house.

In exactly three minutes from the time the fire was reported the apparatus was on its way.

NO APPROPRIATIONS FOR AUTOMOBILES

Washington, Aug. 2.—The purchase of automobiles for the private use of government officials was attacked by Mr. Sims (Tenn.), during consideration of the urgent deficiency appropriation bill in the house today. The senate amendment appropriating \$12,000 for the purchase of vehicles for the speaker and the vice president was disagreed to. Mr. Sims criticized the use of automobiles by the quartermaster's department of the army and expressed his conviction that it was an outrage for the government to provide automobiles for the private use of officials, while \$5 and \$12 pensions were being paid to widows of soldiers and the salaries of clerks were being paid down to reduce expenses.

"I am getting tired of this aping of the ways of royalty," he said. "I can't believe that the speaker wants an automobile after he has walked here for 35 years."

Mr. Clark, the minority leader, declared if any of the items for appropriations for automobiles or other items of increased expenditures were agreed to by the house conferees, the bill would never be passed by the house without a quorum present. No objection being made, the committee of the whole recommended that the amendments be disagreed to and the house adopted the recommendation.

FLORENCE ROBERTS TO WED THURLOW BERGEN

San Francisco, Aug. 3.—Florence Roberts, the actress, known in private life as Mrs. Lewis Morrison, widow of the veteran actor of that time, is en route to her home at Peekskill, N. Y., in company with her mother, and according to a report circulated here.

NEGRO BISHOP ARRAYS HIS RACE FOR LAZINESS

Chicago, Aug. 3.—The Rt. Rev. Henry McNeal Turner of Atlanta, Ga., senior bishop of the African M. E. church, accused his race of submission to political oppression, and appealed to them to stand up and fight for their rights, in an address here last evening. "You men and women of the colored race," he said, "do not realize your numerical power and you are too slow to figure it out. A popular estimate of negroes in the United States is 10,000,000. That is far from correct. There are not less than 15,000,000 in this country, and there are 4,000 colored babies born every day. We are here and we should be a great political factor or nothing. At present we are nothing, and as long as we submit, we shall have our liberties gradually limited."

TAFT FAVORS GOOD ROADS MOVEMENT

Washington, Aug. 3.—President Taft today indicated his hearty approval of the good roads movement, the latest expression being elicited in connection with a movement for better highways in Virginia, this taking shape in an immediate program of road work from the national capital to Richmond. In a letter on the subject the President says:

"I regard this as part of the general good roads movement in the country, and I have pleasure in saying that there is no movement that I know of that will have a more direct effect to relieve the difficulties and burdens of the farmer's life, will stimulate trade and add to the general happiness of the people, more than the establishment of good roads throughout the country. I do not think that because this may have been stimulated by people using automobiles is to be frowned down upon, for, while persons using automobiles are by no means the most important in the community, the fact that their sharp interest has focussed the attention of the public on the movement entitles them to credit."

MRS. RUSSELL SAGE TO BUILD WORKMEN'S COTTAGE

New York, Aug. 3.—Mrs. Russell Sage is preparing to build many cottages near her home in Cedarhurst, L. I., to be let to working people at nominal rents. It is stated that \$12 per month will be the maximum. Each cottage will contain modern improvements and will be of frame and two stories high.

CHINA AND JAPAN TO SETTLE RAILWAY DISPUTE

Tokio, Aug. 3.—It transpired today that the greatest stumbling-block in the way of an amicable settlement between China and Japan of the differences over the Antung-Mukden railway, is the order issued by the Chinese authorities that no Chinese should be employed along the line under severe penalty.

This and several other questions concerning Japanese policy in China will be discussed by the emperor yesterday, by Foreign Minister Komura.

One of the principal points at issue since the opening of the Chien Tao boundary dispute between China, Japan and Russia, has been the question of railway extension and the establishment of independent municipalities along the rights of way of the various lines on the Liao Tung peninsula. The controversy is of long standing, and it has been added such other differences as that arising from the seizure by the Chinese authorities of the Japanese merchant ship, Tatsu Maru and the question of a boycott of Japanese goods in the empire.

All of these matters have been thrashed out by Komura, and in submitting the negotiations to the emperor so far as his government is concerned.

TWO ITALIAN CHILDREN KIDNAPPED

St. Louis, Aug. 2.—Two children were abducted and held for \$25,000 ransom here today, the first abduction of the kind in the local Italian colony, of which the children's parents are among the wealthiest members. The police have arrested five on suspicion, but have not found the children.

Samuel Turrill was seen with the children shortly after they disappeared.

MANHATTAN BEACH HITTED BY CABLE

New York, Aug. 2.—At Manhattan beach, near Coney island, there was hit today the end of a new cable which has just been laid by the Commercial Cable company to Newfoundland. It connects there with a line laid 25 years ago across the Atlantic from Ireland to Canso, N. S., but which was lately moved to terminate near St. Johns, N. F. The change will make the two legs of the trans-atlantic service more equal and will increase the speed and capacity of the wires.

DROWNING MAN DRAGGED DOWN RESCUERS

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—Clutching two comrades in his dying grip, John McCuskey drowned today near San Quentin prison in sight of 200 counts and carried to death with him William Darling and Louis Crauer, who tried to rescue him when the small boat in which they with two others were rowing sank in the tides of the bay.

DEATHS FROM CANCER SIMPLY APPALLING

New York, Aug. 2.—One man in every 32 and one woman in every 11 die from cancer in this country, according to Dr. Milton F. Foote, consulting physician to the New York Skin and Cancer hospital. "I have no hesitancy in declaring cancer the worst physical scourge which we have to combat today," said Dr. Foote in an interview, "Can-

cer is far more dreaded than tuberculosis, for although the death rate from cancer is not yet so great as that from tuberculosis, it is steadily on the increase, while the great white plague has been partially conquered by medical experimentation and is on the decrease."

BP. J. D. O'CONNEL'S VIEWS OF SPANISH SITUATION

Pittsburg, Aug. 3.—Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, head of the Catholic church in the United States, accompanied by Bishop D. J. O'Connell of San Francisco, passed through here late last night on his way to Salt Lake, Utah, where he will dedicate a church.

The cardinal had retired, but Bishop O'Connell, who has traveled extensively in Spain, was interested in the latest news from the country and when asked for a statement, said: "The signs have been pointing to apostasy for some time here. There can be but one opinion regarding the unspeakable atrocities committed."
