MUCH DISUNION AMONG LIBERALS.

Trouble is Caused by Division on the Boer War.

A MOST ACUTE CRISIS ON.

By Some Regarded as Most Serious since split on the Rome Rule Bill -No Reply to Asquith.

New York, June 22 .- The correspondent in London of the Tribune thinks that Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's position in the present condition of the liberal party is unenviable, but not absolutely impossible. His retention of the leadership is necessary in order to prevent the break up of the liberal party. Mr. Asquith and Sir Henry Fowler are further removed from Mr. Morley, Mr. Lloyd-George, Mr. Labouchere and Mr. Massingham than they are from the tory side, and the recent event: by which faction spirit has been embittered makes Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman a heaven sent compromise ader. This exhibition of liberal disunion occurs when the ministry itself is convicted of political incapacity.

The radical split is regarded in some quarters in England as the most acute crisis known in parliamentary life since the memorable rupture of the liberal party on the home rule bill. TAFT MADE GOVERNOR.

Secretary of War Issues Order Making Him Philippine Ruler.

Washington, June 21 .- Secy. Root toissued the order of the President establishing civil government in the Philippines. The order follows: Philippines.

Philippines. The order follows: On and after the 4th day of July, 1901, unless it shall be otherwise or-dered, the President of the Philippine commission shall exercise the executive authority in all civil affairs in the gov-erement of the Philippine islands here. rnment of the Philippine islands here-ofore exercised in such affairs by the governor of the Philippines. and to that end William H. Taft, president of the said commission, is hereby appointed civil governor of the Philippine islands. Such executive authority will be exercised under and in conformi-

ty to the instructions to the Philippine commission dated April 7, 1900, and sub-ject to the approval of the secretary of of the United States. The municipal and provisional civil nents which have been or shall reafter be established in said islands. persons performing duties appertaining to the offices of civil govern ment in said islands, will, in respect of such duties, report to the said civil gov-ernor. The power to appoint civil officers heretofore vested in the Philippine ment. commission and the military governor will be exercised by the civil governor, with the advice and consent of the commission.

May Stop Drug Cutting.

Chicago, June 22 .- The Chronicle says: Out of negotiations now pending be-tween members of the National Retail Druggists' Association and manufac-turers of patent medicines may come an agreement which will result in a blow to the cut rate drug business. Officers of the Retail Druggists' as-

sociation and manufacturers have held sociation and manufacturers have held soveral conferences in Chicago. New York and Detroit lately, and the terms of the agreement between the two in-terests have been practically decided upon. It is exnected that the formal announcement of a pact will be made within a few days. Under the terms manufacturers will name a price at which their drugs are to be sold, and in case any dealers should sell below this stipulated sum they agree to refuse to sell another bill of goods to the firm breaking the agree-The practice of selling goods to cutters indirectly through a second party is also to cease.

United States Alone.

It Was \$255,954,654 for the World-Decrease Owing to the Boer War.

New York, June 21 .- The Engineering and Mining Journal will tomorrow publish complete estimates of the gola output in the United States and in the world at large last year. The figures, \$118,435,562 for the United States and \$255,954,654 for the world at large (com-pared with \$95,518,718 and \$311,505,984 in 1899) do not differ materially from the estimates of several months ago. Regarding the world's output the Engineering and Mining Journal ob-serves: "The unfavorable result was serves: "The unfavorable result was due to the small contribution made by the Transvaal mines, a few only of which were operated during the early months of the year. Deducting the Transvaal output from the grand totals Transvani output from the grand totals for 1899 and 1900, the statistics show an increase in the other gold-producing countries of \$10,717,000. The largest gains were made by the United States, Canada, India, Rhodesia and Brazi, abde in Australia, and China, there while in Australia and China there
