

MUCH DISUNION AMONG LIBERALS.

Trouble is Caused by Division on
the Boer War.

A MOST ACUTE CRISIS ON.

By some Regarded as Most Serious
Since Split on the Home Rule Bill
—No Reply to Asquith.

New York, June 22.—The correspondence in London of the Tribune thinks that Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's position in the present condition of the liberal party is unenviable, but not altogether impossible. His retention of the leadership is necessary in order to prevent the break up of the liberal party. Mr. Asquith and Sir Henry Pender are further removed from Mr. Morley, Mr. Lloyd-George, Mr. Labouchere and Mr. Massingham than they are from the Tory side, and the recent events by which faction spirit has been embittered makes Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman a heaven sent compromise leader. This exhibition of liberal disunion occurs when the ministry itself is convicted of political ineptitude.

The radical split is regarded in some quarters in England as the most acute crisis known in parliamentary life since the memorable rupture of the liberal party on the home rule bill. The collision between the imperialists and the anti-imperialists had long been foreseen, and it is believed that nothing could have averted it except the resignation of the prime minister. At about half past eight the excitement had begun to cool down, and it seems tolerably certain that for the present at least, the liberal party will remain united. TAFT MADE GOVERNOR.

Secretary of War Issues Order Making Him Philippine Ruler.

Washington, June 21.—Secretary Root today issued the order of the President establishing civil government in the Philippines. The order follows:

On and after the 4th day of July, 1901, unless it shall be otherwise ordered, the President of the United States shall exercise the executive authority in all civil affairs in the government of the Philippine Islands heretofore exercised in such affairs by the military governor of the Philippines, and to that end William H. Taft, president of the said commission, is hereby appointed civil governor of the Philippine Islands. Such executive authority will be exercised under and in conformity to the instructions to the Philippine commission dated April 7, 1900, and subject to the approval of the secretary of war of the United States.

The municipal and provisional civil governments which have been or shall hereafter be established in said islands, shall have the same powers and authority pertaining to the offices of civil government in said islands, will, in respect of such duties, report to the said civil governor. The power to appoint civil officers heretofore vested in the Philippine commission and the military governor will be exercised by the civil governor, with the advice and consent of the commission.

The military governor of the Philippines is hereby relieved from the performance, on and after the said 4th day of July, of the civil duties heretofore described, but his authority will continue to be exercised as heretofore in those districts in which insurrection against the authority of the United States continues to exist, and in which public order is not sufficiently restored to enable provincial civil governments to be established under the instructions to the commission, dated April 7, 1900. MacArthur's Casualty List.

Washington, June 21.—Gen. MacArthur at Manila announces some recent casualties among the troops in the Philippines as a result of the recent engagement at Lupa, Luzon. Private John J. Rogers, company D, Twenty-first Infantry, died from wounds received in that action. First Sgt. Frank E. Stearns, company D, Twenty-first Infantry, was wounded, not severely, in the leg, and Rudolph Corik was slightly wounded in the thigh.

NEW MINISTER TO VENEZUELA.

Mr. Bowen Expresses No Opinion About German-Venezuelan Question.

New York, June 22.—Herbert W. Bowen, the newly appointed United States minister to Venezuela, who is stopping in London taking a few days' rest prior to his departure for the United States from Persia, where he has been United States minister for the last two years, is quoted in a Herald dispatch as saying of his future post: "I don't pretend to know anything of the merits of the German-Venezuelan question, having only seen occasional references to the subject in the papers. It would therefore be foolish for me to express any view of the subject, even were I disposed to do so, which I do not consider right of me to do."

"Generally speaking, I think the duty of a representative of any country is first and foremost to promote friendly feeling on the part of all nations with whom he may be brought in contact. It is, unfortunately, only too easy to provoke trouble, especially by injudicious expressions."

"Yes, I am pleased at the change from Persia to a more active sphere, but I do not look forward to any complication which may not be smoothed over by the exercise of a little common sense."

Farewell to Dr. P. A. Noble.

Chicago, June 22.—Members of the Union Park Congregational church gave a farewell reception last night to their retiring pastor, Dr. Frederick A. Noble, and presented him a testimonial fund of \$5,000. The reduction was held in the parlors of the church over which Dr. Noble has presided for twenty-two years.

MORGAN'S ART PURCHASE.

He Secures Reynolds' "Lady Delma and Her Daughter" at a Great Price.

New York, June 22.—A special dispatch from London to the World announces that J. Pierpont Morgan has made another great art purchase. He has just acquired Sir Joshua Reynolds' famous portrait group "Lady Delma and Her Daughter." He bought the picture from the dealer, Charles Wetherell. This portrait, which stands high among Reynolds' masterpieces, changed hands at Christie's auction room nine years ago at \$55,000. Mr. Morgan is now said to have paid \$110,000 for it. Reynolds painted it in 1780 for Lady Delma who was a sister of the then Earl of Carlisle and a great beauty. Reynolds received \$1,650 for it.

BRIGADE OF COLORADO MEN

Movement on Foot to Form One of Those Who Saw Service in Philippines.

For a Guard for Service in Development of Asphalt Beds of Venezuela.

Denver, Colo., June 22.—A movement is on foot to organize a brigade of Colorado men who saw service in the Philippines into a guard for service in the development of the great asphalt beds of Venezuela. Several members of the first Colorado, which saw service in the Philippines, headed by Lieut. Col. Cassius M. Moses, formerly of Pueblo, will be in the company. It is said with Gen. Francis V. Greene of New York in command.

Among the members of the party, will be five undergraduates West Point cadets who were recently expelled for hazing. The present relations between Venezuela and her neighbors impart significance to the part the Americans may take there.

May Stop Drug Cutting.

Chicago, June 22.—The Chronicle says: Out of negotiations now pending between members of the National Retail Druggists' Association and manufacturers of patent medicines may come an agreement which will result in a blow to the cut rate drug business.

Officers of the Retail Druggists' association and manufacturers have held several conferences in Chicago. New York and Detroit lately, and the terms of the agreement between the two interests have been practically decided upon. It is expected that the formal announcement of a pact will be made within a few days.

Under the terms manufacturers will name a price at which their drugs are to be sold, and in case any dealer should sell below this stipulated sum they agree to refuse to sell another bill of goods to the firm breaking the agreement. The practice of selling goods to customers indirectly through a second party is also to cease.

SEIZURE OF THE WILLAMETTE

Question Raised by Canadian Government Amicably Settled.

New York, June 22.—The seizure of the wrecking steamer Willamette in British Columbia waters, has been settled in accordance with the contentions of the Canadian government, says an Ottawa dispatch to the Times. A convention exists between the United States and Canadian governments, for reciprocity of wrecking in waters contiguous to each other's territory. The Willamette was working in Union Bay, 80 miles from the Canadian frontier, and the Dominion government, taking the view that this could not be held to be contiguous waters, seized the vessel. The United States government then took the matter up, but when the view of the Canadian government authorities was brought out the United States officials conceded that it was a proper one, and no further action was taken.

WORLD'S OUTPUT OF GOLD.

For Last Year It Was \$118,435,562 for the United States Alone.

It Was \$255,954,654 for the World—Decrease Owing to the Boer War.

New York, June 21.—The Engineering and Mining Journal will tomorrow publish complete estimates of the gold output in the United States and in the world at large last year. The figures, \$118,435,562 for the United States and \$255,954,654 for the world at large compared with \$99,518,718 and \$311,965,384 in 1899 do not differ materially from the estimates of several months ago.

Regarding the world's output the Engineering and Mining Journal observes: "The unfavorable result was due to the small contribution made by the Transvaal mines, a few only of which were operated during the early months of the year. Deducting the Transvaal output from the grand totals for 1899 and 1900, the statistics show an increase in the other gold-producing countries of \$10,717,000. The largest gains were made by the United States, Canada, India, Rhodesia and Brazil, while in Australia and China there were important decreases."

In one respect the gold situation of 1900, was unprecedented. It has never happened that the output of a great gold-producing country has been entirely cut off, or almost entirely. The Transvaal, which produced \$78,070,761 in gold in 1899 was expected to yield over \$55,000,000 in 1900, and in October, 1899, and the total for that year was \$72,961,501, while in 1900 the only production from the few mines which were operated by the government in the opening months of the year and this work was stopped when the British armies reached Johannesburg. Instead of \$118,435,562, Transvaal appears in our table for only \$2,300,000.

"The United States, which in 1899 ranked third among the great gold producers, in 1900 showed a substantial increase, mainly due to the substitution of the Transvaal, put it in the first place in 1900. Australia dropped from first place to second place, while Canada took the third rank, though at a fourth interval. Rhodesia, which in 1899 ranked fourth, produced 72.9 per cent of the total."

TORNADO SWEEPS

NAPIER, NEB.

In Its Path of Destruction it Leaves
Seven Dead.

TWO ARE FATALLY HURT.

Several Severely Injured. The Victims Mostly Belong to Two Families—A Mother Tells Her Story.

Napier, Neb., June 21.—A tornado which swept down the Koya Paha river and struck this town last night has left a trail of death and destruction. Seven persons are dead, several others injured, two of them fatally. The killed and wounded are members of two families, Greening and Anderson.

Mrs. Greening, mother of the Greening family, has a broken shoulder and she is injured internally. Mary Anderson, mother of the Anderson family, is seriously injured. The father was away from home at the time.

The father of the Greening family was found a quarter of a mile from the house badly mangled. Both arms and legs and back were broken, and there is no chance for his life.

Little Maggie and Jacob Greening were found 600 yards from where the house stood. They were stripped of all their clothing, but were not disfigured. The other two children were close to the house and were in full view of their mother and sister, who were both fatally injured, and who could see them, but could render no assistance.

Six hours before the storm the sun was shining. The storm cloud appeared about 5 o'clock and traveled down the Koya Paha river. It seemed to rise up and skip some houses and then swoop down and demolish others. The tornado was preceded by a severe hail storm. Stones fell that measure ten inches in circumference.

Mrs. Anderson took refuge under a bench near her home with three children. She said: "I saw the cloud coming and knew it was bad, and I grabbed the youngest child and took two with me. When the storm struck the house, it tore it right in the air, and that was the last of it."

"I hurried to my children, but the storm took two of them away from me and killed them. I lay down and held my baby. The wind also took it away from me. A timber struck me and broke my shoulder. After the storm all my clothes and shoes and stockings were gone."

The big wagon bridge across the Koya Paha river was completely destroyed.

Passengers from Dawson.

Victoria, B. C., June 2.—The steamer Cossack City, which arrived last night, brought ten passengers from Dawson who came up the river on the steamer Dawson, which made a record trip to White Horse, and was the first steamer to make the trip through.

She arrived in three days, thirteen hours, clipping two hours off last year's record. She brought a shipment of half a million dollars for the Canadian Bank of Commerce. This arrived at Skagway before the Cossack City left.

Stomper Bailey was sunk in the Lower Fifty Mile river, she having struck a rock. She will be saved, however.

C. A. Bradford Missing.

Chicago, June 2.—C. A. Bradford, a stranger in Chicago, but believed to be a man of prominence in San Francisco, was reported missing from the city on June 4, and the police have been asked to find him. Paul play is feared. Bradford, when he engaged the room, spoke as though he was in the insurance business, and also mentioned certain interests in Butte, Mont. On June 4 he left the house in the evening, saying he was going to keep a business engagement at the Palmer house. That was the last seen of him. Bradford left property worth several hundred dollars in his room.

It is also said Bradford may be a theatrical manager from San Francisco.

A NETHERLAND ENTERPRISE.
