## GOV. CUTLER DRAWS

U. S. Marshal William Spry is Now Only Republican Candidate for Governorial Nomination.

United States Marshal William Spry is now the only Republican candidate for the gubernatorial nomination in the field. John C. Cutler, the present incumbent this morning verified a report that he had withdrawn as a candidate for re-election, and gave as the reason that four years ago Marshal Spry had materially helped him to secure the nomination, for which reason he felt that he did not desire to run against him for the nomination this year.

The announcement of Marshal Spry as a definite candidate was made last week, and it was followed very shortly by a determination on the part of Gov. Cutler to retire from the race. So far no other Republican is in the field, according to the bona fide information, with a definite plan to capture the governor's chair. Informal mention of a number of candidates has been made, but none have yet come out into prominence.

On the Democratic side more timber is definitely out for recognition, Lyman M. Martin, T. N. Taylor of Provo, Wm. Roylance of Provo, and several others are being discussed in a definite manner.

"Good roads and temperance" are twin platform planks that found their way in the Sixth district senatorial and judicial Republican convention. They are welcome echoes to the campaigners on both subjects who are prominently present in Salt Lake.

"Our beautiful bumpy boulevards" from Salt Lake to Ogden promise to get a good fixing this week for almost every public official from commissioner to village mayor has been given a bumping up over them and urged to do his duty and do it well.

## SUNDAY LTD ON TIGHT

Chief Pitt's Order Generally Observed By Saloonkeepers—Dry Sabbath at Saltair.

As a result of the order issued by Chief of Police Pitt, the "lid" was on tight yesterday. So far as known, none of the saloons sold liquor, and the drug stores also refrained from violating the Sunday closing law. Some of the saloon keepers refused to join the Mutual Protective association and kept their clear stands open. Those places were listed by Chief Pitt's minions and the fact that when license is due again, he will refuse to approve the applications. Some of the saloon licenses expired on June 30, and when they come up for renewal, there is likely to be trouble.

Chief Pitt was positive in the declaration that those who refused to obey the order will have to suffer for it. "I have been fair with the saloon men," said he, "and I think they should be willing to meet me half way in this matter. I will have my turn when the licenses come up for me for my signature. I know all the saloons that have violated the order, and those who refuse to help me will have to take the consequences."
