Abyssinian capital and the northwest of Lake Rudolf, in the neighborhood of one side four spacious well-thatched huts and a curious mound, probably sucrificial. By the side of the huts thousands of cow bells, sweet in tone the Angle-Abyssinian boundary, The expedition, which was accom-

panled by the secretary of the British legation at Adis Ababa, was composed, saya Reuter, of over 2,000 men, and was sent out by the Emperor Menclek to capture Shifara, an Abyssinian outhaw who had been murdering and raidog in Abyssinian territory. It was way eight months, and failed to cap-

ture Shiffra. For considerable distances the expedition was followed by natives, who hid themselves amid the thick ejephant grass nine feet high bordering the path, and it became necessary to forfify the camps and make zarebas every night.

The route followed by the expedition from Adis Ababa to the southwest passes through the interesting little Mohammedian state of Djimma, which is presided over by its own king, Abagifar, the last of the rulers from whom Menelok has his title of "King of Kings of Ethiopia.
