LOCAL BRIEFS.

David Keith a Grandpa—David Keith is in receipt of a telegram from Medford, Or., stating a son had been born to Lieut. and Mrs. A. C. Allen, thus making Mr. Keith a happy grandpa.

Doyle Buys Property—The transfer was recorded yesterday afternoon of 53x165 feet on Second East near State streets, from the Pioneer Investment and Trust company to Geo. D. Doyle for \$16,987.50, for purposes of investment.

Play at Y. M. C. A.—The play of "Our Boys" will be given this evening, in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium with four boys and four girls in the cast, and then 40 little girls will present "Daisy Drills and Songs" under the direction of Miss Burkella Pierce.

Work for Improvement—Residents of Second street are organizing a Second Street club whose object it will be to improve the street, including macadamizing, sewerage, and curbing, and to see that property is cared for in the absence of its owners.

Company Incorporated—A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Murray Irrigation company of Murray was filed in the county clerk's office yesterday afternoon. Its capital stock is \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$5 each. R. E. Miller is president; J. M. Wood, vice president; J. G. Park, secretary and treasurer.

Amended Articles—An amendment to the articles of incorporation of the Draper-Christensen company of Monticello has been filed in the secretary of state's office by which the name of the company is changed to the Consolidated Mercantile company and its capital stock is increased from \$15,000 to \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$5 each.

Will Erect Search Light—A 40 foot scaffolding has been erected over the Aztec building's first South street front, for the installation of a large search light of the same size as that used at the ice plant. It is immediately over the apartment on the ground floor to be occupied by the electrical display, and will be operated all of conference week.

Italian Man Recovered—Michael Angimmo, the Italian who was stabbed by a fellow countryman a day or two ago, is reported to be recovering. A successful operation was performed upon the man at St. Mark's hospital, and it is believed that he will live. Giovanni, who did the stabbing, is in the city jail, and it is likely that some charge will be preferred against him today.

Irrigation Company—A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Green River City Irrigation company of Green River, Utah, has been filed in the secretary of state's office. The capital stock of the company is \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$5 each. D. M. Landroth is president and manager; Frank Cook, vice president; G. N. Stevenson, secretary and treasurer.

Jap Under Arrest—T. Gunia, a brown man, who is said to have a "black" record, was arrested yesterday by Detectives Shannon and Wilson, charged with being the principal wrongdoer in the row of Tuesday during which a fellow Jap was slashed with a knife. Gunia hails from Seattle, where, it is alleged, his picture is in the album made up of a collection of pictures of shady characters.

To Improve Tracks—The street car tracks at the intersection of First South and Main streets, are to be taken up and replaced with the latest improved standard intersections of 80 pound steel, with curves so arranged that the cars will not be swayed or jolted as they swing around. As soon as the weather permits, gangers of men will be spread over the system, facing up the tracks, and putting everything in order.

Ordinance Approved—Mayor Thompson has approved the O'Donnell ordinance increasing the salaries of the nurse at the isolation hospital from \$75 to \$100 per month, the steward from \$60 to \$75 and the cook from \$40 to \$50 per month. He also approved the ordinance for the paying of Second South from Third to Tenth East street, and the ordinance for a sidewalk extension on the south side of South Temple street between Sixth and Eleventh East streets.

Violated Parole—Deputy Sheriff Isaac Emery, 1444 East 21st, today wheeled a young girl who has violated her parole from the State Industrial school, and she will be taken back to the school to remain until she reaches her majority. The girl was paroled several months ago and since then has been associated with bad company in and around the rooms at 1100 East 21st, where she was taken into custody again and sent her back to the reform school.

Had Boy Caught—Dayton Fernstermaker, a boy 13 years of age who escaped from the State Industrial school at Ogden on March 19, was captured yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Isaac Emery and was taken back to Ogden today. The boy was committed by Judge Armstrong of the district court on Feb. 21 for assaulting his grandmother with a poker and for petty larceny. Deputy Sheriff Emery has been looking for him for several days and when he located him on state road the boy tried to get away but was captured after quite a lengthy chase.
