

STRIKERS RESENT TROOPS' ARRIVAL

They Gathered Around Steel Car Company's Plant at Lyndora, Pa., and Started a Riot.

THOUSANDS LINED STREETS.

Soldiers Had Not Proceeded Twenty Yards Before Violent Assault Was Made on Them.

Butler, Pa., July 18.—In a riot following the unexpected arrival here of a detachment of state constabulary late this afternoon, a striking employee of the Standard Steel Car company of Lyndora was fatally injured and two bystanders were seriously wounded. Thirty supposed strike leaders were arrested. The strikers gathered around the plant, angered at the arrival of the troops. This caused the clash.

The entrance today of 500 employees of the Standard Wheel company, a concern manufacturing pressed steel wheels, into the ranks of the 2,500 striking men of the Standard Steel Car company has caused the situation here to be regarded as serious.

The strikers, it is reported, had been told that two box cars had been taken into the plant yard, loaded with outside workmen. A rush was made upon the gates and the cars searched, but were found to be loaded with material. The crowd then dispersed.

The approach of the constabulary became known through strike pickets. An alarm was sounded throughout the little suburb of Lyndora, where the plant of the Standard Steel Car company is located, and within a few moments thousands of strikers and their sympathizers lined the streets. Slowly the troops cleared the streets and all railways were apparently clear at the car company's plant.

Marching order was again formed, but the troops had not ridden 20 yards before they were pelted with bottles, slag, pieces of board and lumps of coal thrown from the tops of the houses along the narrow street.

The troops were ordered to draw and load their guns. As the column of forty men advanced the crowds again surged into the streets. Putting their horses to a trot, the constabulary rode into the crowd, firing their weapons into the ground. It was during this clash that three persons were

shot. The strikers used revolvers freely, it is said. Following the clash, the strikers gathered on a hill and held an impromptu meeting. They were addressed by Father Becavaca of the Catholic church, who advised against violence and bloodshed.

Addressing Sheriff Caldwell, who stood at the edge of the crowd, Father Becavaca said: "If you will take these troops away I will guarantee that there will be no further violence." The sheriff stated the car company officials had requested the troops, and an attempt would be made tomorrow to operate the car plant.

The constabulary established quarters inside the car company's plant. The company officials stated tonight that they did not recognize the strike in any way.

"We will not arbitrate the matter," said General Manager Altman. "Those who wish can return to work tomorrow, as we intend to resume operations at that time."

SAINT ANNE'S BONES.
Said to Have Performed Some Wonderful Miracles Lately.

New York, July 18.—Communicants of the Church of Jean Baptiste, in West Seventy-sixth street, are firmly convinced that a wonderful miracle has been performed through the agency of the wrist bones of St. Anne. Several of the parishioners report that they saw the sight restored to a woman who had been blind for 12 years. The Novena, held annually in preparation for the feast day of St. Anne, which occurs a week from tomorrow, began on Saturday in this church, which holds as relics of St. Anne several of her wrist bones. These are kept in a glass-covered silver bowl, in the shrine at all times except during the Novena, when the little bowl is brought forth, and the thousands of believers who throng the church are permitted to kiss it and pray to St. Anne for deliverance from their physical ailments and mental woes.

Mrs. Mary Brown of 421 Willis avenue, was praying at the altar when two altar boys led in an aged blind woman. The blind woman had prayed only a few minutes when the priest extended to her the relics of St. Anne, and she kissed the silver receptacle. Then suddenly she cried out loud:

"I see you, oh, good St. Anne, I see you."

Mrs. Brown led the woman to a pew, thinking that perhaps her devotion had overcome her, but there it was observed that the aged woman's eyes were open and that she could see plainly. She cried with joy as she declared she could see as when she was a young girl. She said her name was Mrs. Purcell; that she lived in Amsterdam avenue and that she had buried 12 children. Excited communicants gathered about the joyful woman and while many attest the fact that she was blind when she entered the church, and that she was made to see, none in the excitement, thought to obtain her full name and address. Priests are seeking her today.

DON CARLOS OF BOURBON IS DEAD

After Long Illness Pretender to Spanish Throne Dies at Varese in Lombardy.

HE HAD A CHECKERED CAREER

In 1873 Entered Spain and Announced He Had Come to Save the Country but Was Mistaken.

Rome, July 18.—Don Carlos of Bourbon, pretender to the Spanish throne, died today at Varese in Lombardy. He had been ill for a long time and the latest reports indicated that he was suffering from apoplexy.

Don Carlos, Duke of Madrid, who claimed under the Salic law of succession established by Philip V. to be the legitimate king of Spain, by the title of Charles VII, was born at Laybach, Austria, March 30, 1848. His father, Don Juan, was the brother of Don Carlos VII, known as the Count de Montemolins, in support of whose claims the Carlist risings of 1848, 1855 and 1890 were organized.

As Charles VII died in 1881 without children, his rights devolved upon his brother, Don Juan, who had married the Archduchess Maria Teresa of Austria. Their son, Don Carlos, married Margaret de Bourbon. In October, 1888, Don Juan abdicated in favor of his son, whose standard was raised in the north of Spain in 1873 by some of his partisans. Don Carlos himself, after addressing a proclamation to the inhabitants of Catalonia, Aragon and Valencia, calling upon them to take up arms in his cause, entered Spain July 19, 1873, announcing that he came to save the country. Then followed the "Four Years' war," which ended in January, 1876, when Tolosa, the last stronghold of the Carlists, fell and its defenders sought refuge on French territory. Meanwhile the republic ended and the eldest son of former Queen Isabella took the Spanish throne as Alfonso XII.

Alfonso XII died in 1885 and the fight for the succession ranged between Don Carlos and Maria Christina of Austria, widow of the late king. The posthumous birth of the present king in 1886, however, kindled a feeling of loyalty which has existed up to the present. Within recent years there has been a recurrence of the Carlist agitation in Catalonia and other districts which was attributed to the influence of Don Jaime, the only son of Don Carlos, but these movements have proved to be of little importance.

Paris, July 18.—Don Jaime, in an interview tonight, gave the impression that he would follow the policies of his father, Don Carlos.

AMNESTY RECOMMENDED FOR TURKISH OFFENDERS

Constantinople, July 18.—The report of the court-martial on the Adana massacre, made public today, is a strong denunciation of the incapacity and apathy of the police and other local authorities. It says: "Fifteen persons already have been hanged; 800 deserve death; 15,000 deserve hard labor for life; 80,000 deserve minor sentences. If it is decided to proceed with the punishment we will cordon the town and deal expeditiously with the matter." In view, however, of the general reconciliation between the opposing elements, the report recommends that general amnesty be made the occasion of a national fête.

DELAUNAY WAS ENGAGED IN ROBBING CHURCHES

Paris, July 19.—A search of the rooms occupied by Delaunay, a man suspected of planning the recent church and museum robberies in France, and who, when an attempt was made to arrest him, shot and killed Sub-Chief Blot of the detective force, and mortally wounded M. Blot's secretary, M. Nuger, after which he committed suicide has confirmed a suspicion that he was engaged in the robberies referred to. A complete burglar's outfit was found in a safe discovered to contain two wooden reliquaries with enamels, 12 superb enamels on copper, six sculptured ivory, 30 silver cutlery, crucifixes and other valuable antiquities, showing such an expert knowledge in their selection that only a trained antiquarian could have dictated their choice. The police believe an international organization employed Delaunay and his gang, and that most of their spoils eventually reached America.

LAST MEMBER OF JEFFERSON DAVIS' FAMILY IS DEAD

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 18.—Margaret Howell Jefferson Davis Hayes, only surviving member of the late Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate states, styled "Daughter of the Confederacy," wife of J. Addison Hayes, president of the National bank of this city, died tonight at 6 o'clock at her home, after a lingering illness, at the age of 64.

Mrs. Hayes' illness covered a period of several months, most of which was spent in her room. Many messages of inquiry were received recently from friends throughout the country who had gained the impression that Mrs. Hayes was suffering from cancer. The cause of her death was announced by the attending physicians as a complication of diseases.

Mrs. Hayes, the last of the family of the late president of the confederacy, after the death of her sister, Miss Willie Davis, at Richmond, Va., made a trip south a few years ago, when she was made the Daughter of the Confederacy in her sister's stead. Her mother, widow of the southern president, died in New York about two years ago.

The deceased is survived by Jefferson Hayes Davis, a son, aged 21; another son, William Hayes, aged 19; two daughters, Lucy and Mrs. Virginia Webb, wife of Dr. Gerald B. Webb of this city. No arrangements for the funeral have yet been made.

The son, Jefferson Hayes Davis, bears the name of his illustrious grandfather through a special act of the state legislature.

PRICE OF BEEF MAY BECOME PROHIBITORY

Denver, July 18.—The possibility of the price of beef becoming prohibitory for the table of the average workingman because of decreased production in the great beef producing section of the west, is the reason for calling together in convention the cattle breeders of the country. The convention will be held in this city in January, 1910, and will be officiated at by the National Beef Producers' congress. The call for the convention will be the backing of the packers, livestock organizations and business interests generally. It is said, and the ultimate purpose of the convention will be to awaken the west to an appreciation of its duty in the matter of opportunity for revenue through extension of cattle breeding. Unless something is done in this regard, it is said by experts that the price of beef will soar to a height where the average workingman will be unable to pay, and he must consequently deny himself this particular article of food.

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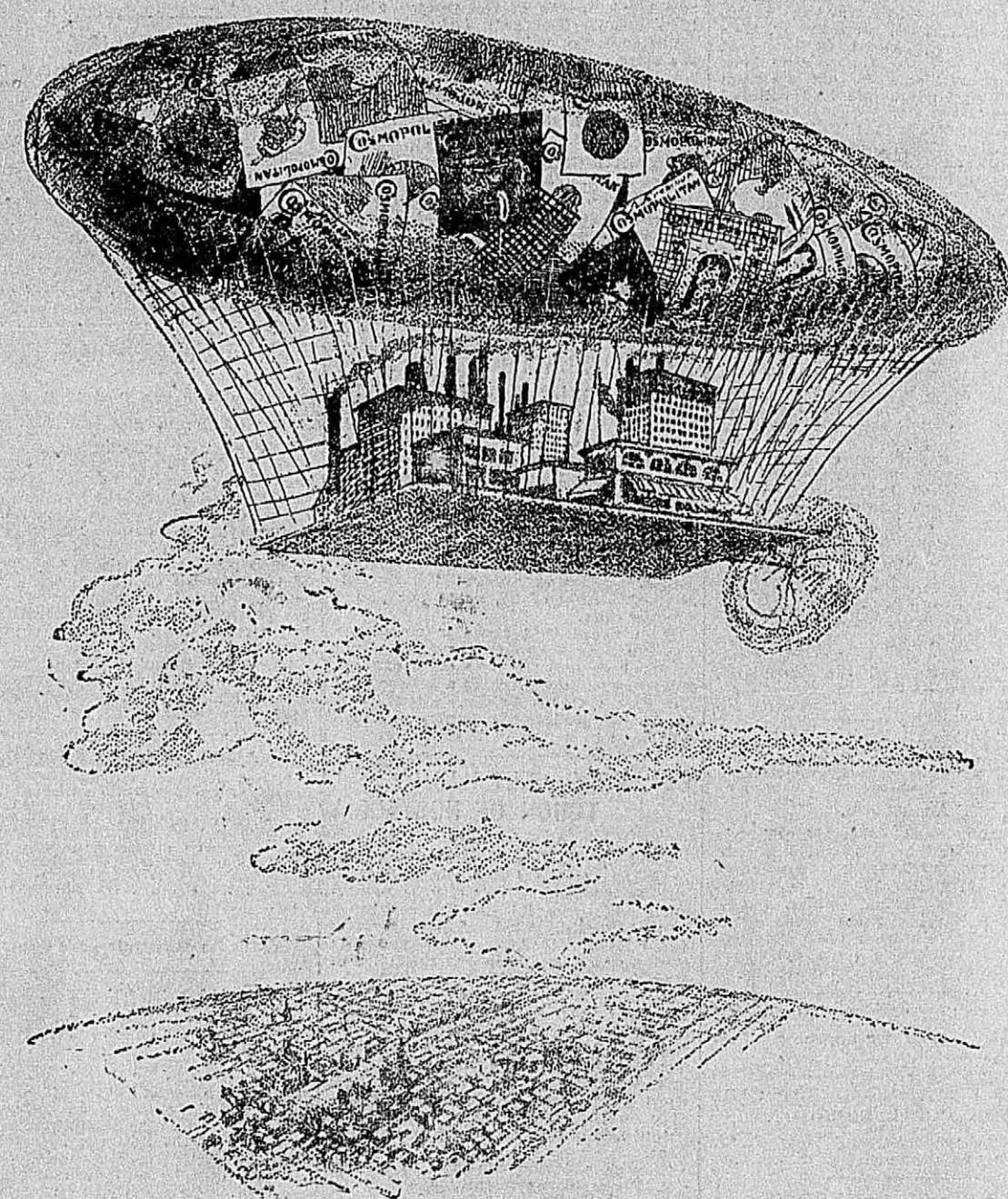
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
