The Westminster Presbyterian ladies will give a bazaar and supper in the church next Friday evening.

The Easter music of the Catholic cathedral will be repeated tomorrow morning, by general request, at the 11 o'clock service.

An invitation has been received by Gov. Cutler to attend the unveiling of the statue of Lieut.-Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest at Memphis, Tenn., on May 16.

Elder B. H. Roberts will speak in the Second ward Sunday night, the meeting commencing at 6:30. There will be special music, including a solo by Jno. Robison, with Tracy Y. Cannon as accompanist.

Sister Mary of the order of Notre Dame, and for 15 years a teacher in St. Mary's academy of this city, has just died at St. Joseph. The news of her death will be learned with regret by many in Salt Lake.

Miss Louise Bascom, a graduate of the Salt Lake High school, and a niece of President Bascom of the Utah state board of health, has captured one of the \$50 prizes at Wellesley college offered for the best story or play. Miss Bascom is in the sophomore class.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Brazier will be held at the Fourth ward meetinghouse, Sunday, at 12 p.m. The remains may be viewed at the residence, 1917, West Seventh South street, until 12 noon Sunday. Friends are invited to attend.

The Athletic association of the East Side High school, composed of Robert L. Duncanson, correspondent for Collier's Weekly, for an illustrated lecture, to be given on Thursday, May 11, at the First Congregational church, Mr. Dunn comes highly recommended. His subject will be, "First in Korea."

BUSY DAY FOR JUVENILE COURT

Sixty Children Out on Probation Reported to Judge Brown This Morning

WERE GIVEN FATHERLY ADVICE.

J. O. Draper Charged With Contributing to Waywardness of His Own Family.

Over 60 children out on probation reported to the juvenile court today bringing notes from their teachers and parents telling of their conduct during the past week. Practically all of the reports were satisfactory and after they were given some good advice by Probation Officer Wood the children were instructed to report again on next Saturday morning.

J. O. Draper is now in the county jail charged with contributing to the waywardness of his children. He was arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Booth and will be taken before Judge Brown of the Juvenile court on Monday and given his choice of either placing himself under the jurisdiction of that court, or being tried before Judge Duglin under section 4224 of the Revised Statutes, which makes it a misdemeanor for a person not to provide for his family.

It is believed that he spends all of his money for drink and his wife is compelled to keep three of her boys from school in order to help make a living. The boys have been before the court for truancy and now Judge Brown intends to prosecute their father for contributing to their delinquency.

APRIL 29th

140—King Edward IV of England born, son of the Duke of York. Died 1461.

1676—Michel Adriaanszoon de Ruyten, or "the Unconquered Rooster," famous Dutch admiral, died; born 1607. De Ruyter distinguished himself in the battle of the English in 1652. In the service of Denmark he defeated the Swedes in 1658.

1702—Levi H. Taft, an eminent Methodist minister, died at Pontefract, England, born 1722.

1788—Cervera's squadron sailed westward from the Cape Verde Islands.

1828—Paul le Châtel, author and explorer, died at St. Petersburg, Russia, born 1795.

1842—Richard S. Greenough, noted American sculptor, died in Italy; born 1819.

1851—Alexander II of Russia, son of Alexander I, born 1808; assassinated March 13, 1881.

1872—John Sampson, hero of the American Revolution, died in Sharon, Mass.; born 1770.

1889—Levi H. Taft, an eminent Methodist minister, died at Pontefract, England, born 1722.

1898—Cervera's squadron sailed westward from the Cape Verde Islands.

1904—Lord Alexander, author and explorer, died at St. Petersburg, Russia, born 1856.

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
