The company is organized with a cap ital stock of \$250,000, divided into 2,500 shares of the par value of \$100 each. The corporation has accepted in full pay. ment for 2,200 shares of capital stock, the exclusive right to purchase from the manufacturers thereof, the Browning automatic shotguns, during the life of the patents thereof, for the purpose of sale thereof throughout the United States and the District of Columbia, the fair cash value of which exclusive right is \$220,000 and the corporation has procured a grant of such right to be exe-cuted by John M. and Matthew S.
