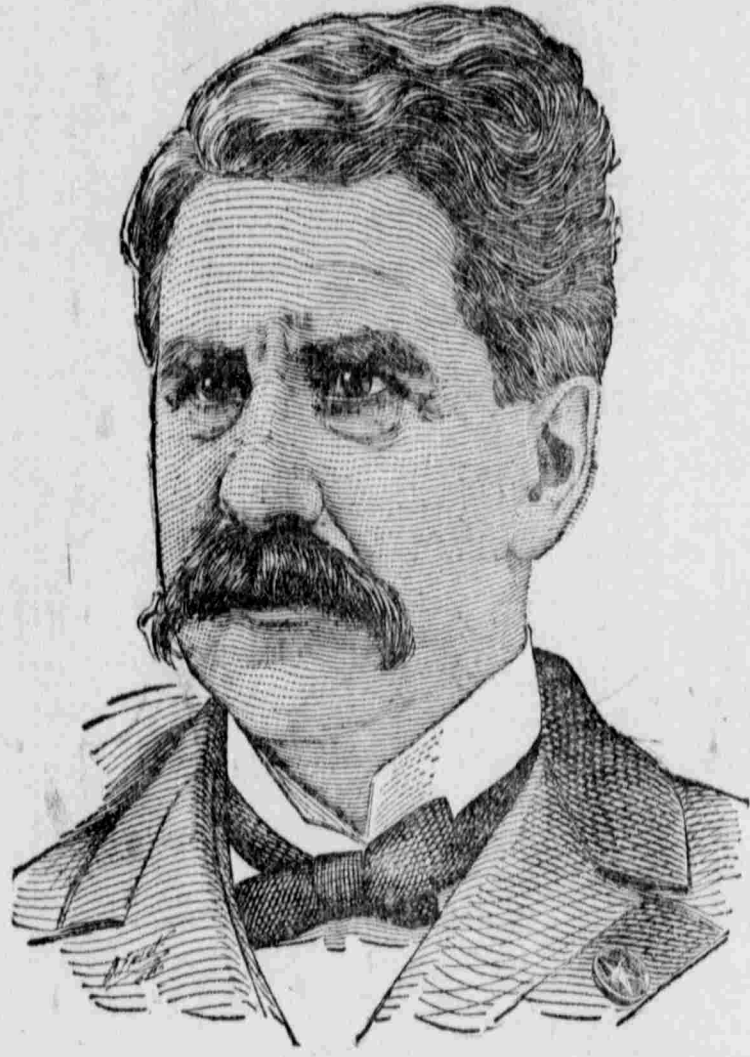

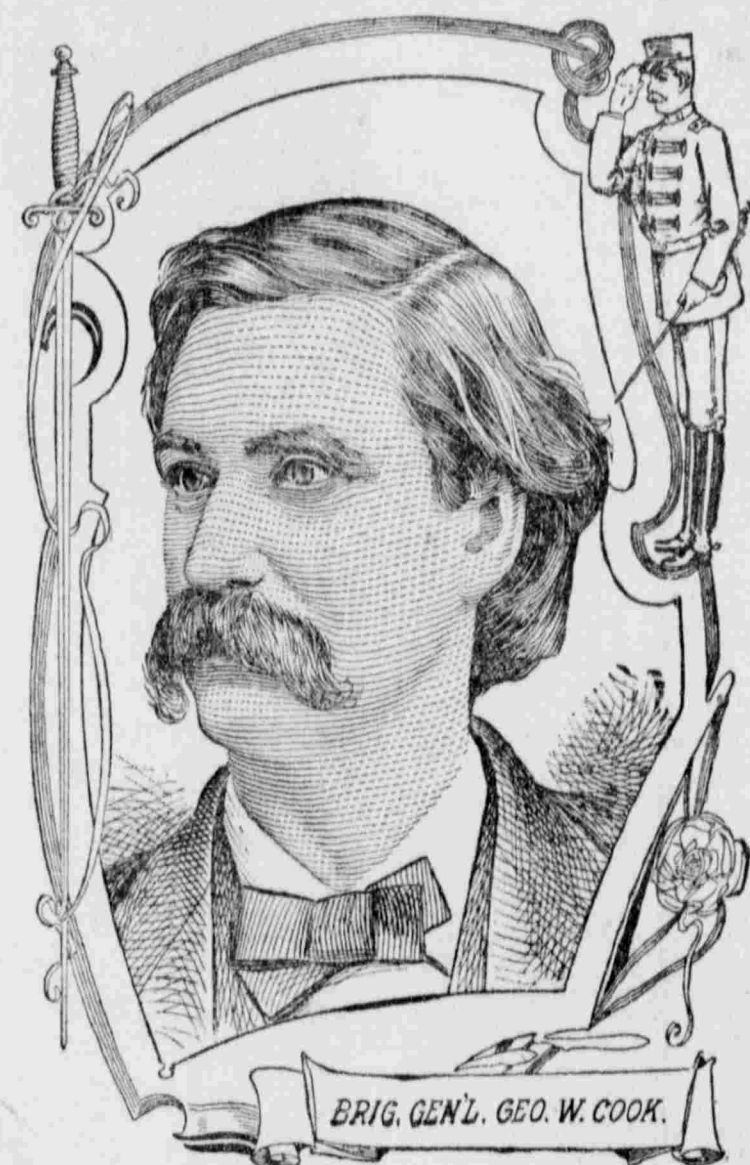

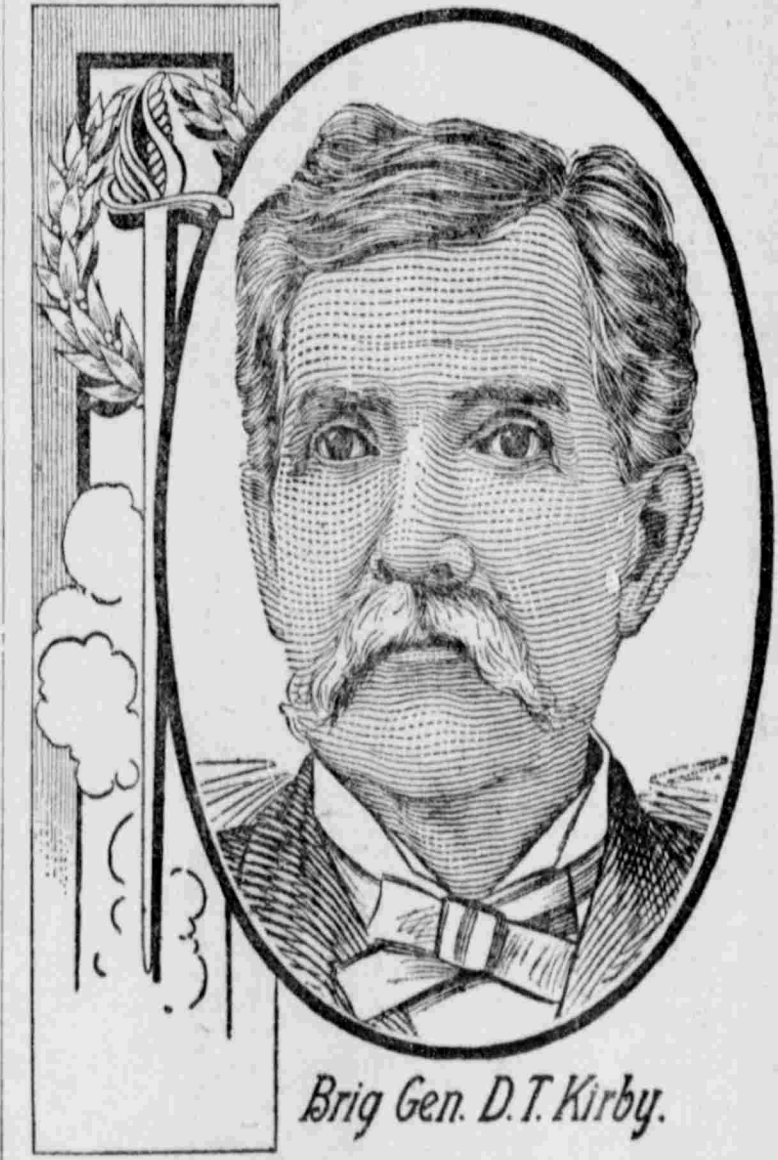


EX-BRIGADIER GENERAL J. FLOYD KING.
