LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Court Proceedings.—The mining controversy known as the Oregon-Battle case is being proceeded with before Judge Schneider in chambers. Yesterday afternoon and this morning witnesses were being examined.

Runaway.—Last evening some employees of the coal company had two span of horses on the "Julia Dean" sleigh, and were going down South Temple Street, when one of the animals became frightened and started to run, his example being followed by the others. The sleigh was filled with men and boys, and was a pretty heavy load, but the horses kept their speed until one of them fell down and was dragged some distance. This brought them to a standstill. No damage of any consequence was done.

Musical.—Professor Georges Castell called on us to-day, introducing Professor Edward Hemburger, who, with his wife, is staying in this city, where they purpose to remain and give lessons in music of the highest class. They are not common players, on musical instruments, but cultured, theoretical musicians and artists. They have received the highest testimonials from the press in various parts of the Union, and Prof. Hemburger has performed on the piano at entertainments given by the great musical celebrities of the time. New Tabernacle.—The progress made towards completing the new Tabernacle is quite satisfactory. Work on the outside has been suspended for the winter. Twenty-five men are now steadily at work making pilasters to cap the stone pilasters, after which the joists and trusses for the heating pipes are also being made. Brother Henry Grow, the superintendent, says that if material and other necessary help is forthcoming, the houses can be finished early next summer. Between fifty and sixty thousand feet of lumber is still required to complete the building. The means necessary to pay for this material is expected from the Saints of this State, whose promptitude already has been a source of encouragement to the building committee.

Opera.—On Monday and Tuesday the 25th and 26th, the English Opera Company will give performances in the Theatre in this city. Mr. C. S. Ammer, the business manager of the company, came into the city yesterday and called at our office to-day. The company perform at Sacramento to-day, and next week at Virginia City. The opera presented here, the Little Duke and The Belle of Corneville, are two new pieces, and wherever presented have been received with great applause. The company intended to have been in San Francisco and the west for six weeks only, instead of which their engagements have been extended to five months, 139 consecutive performances being given. In the Bush Street Theatre, San Francisco. After the two performances here they proceed to Denver and from there to Chicago.

Pleasant Anniversary.—Last evening was the third anniversary of the organization of the Y.M.C.A. of the 15th Ward, and to celebrate the event, a really pleasant entertainment was provided. An interesting program of the history and death of Jesus Christ was followed by a list of the subjects spoken upon in the meetings during the past year. Extracts from the book of Doctrine and Covenants on the death of Joseph and Hyrum Smith were given, after which a quartette was well rendered. The audience then retired into an adjoining room and partook of supper while the floor was being cleared of benches. The whole entertainment closed with a complimentary dance to the members of the association and a few invited friends.

The Next Lecture.—The next of the popular series of lectures in the Twentieth Ward School-house, under the auspices of the Association of that Ward, will be delivered on next Tuesday evening, the 14th inst., by Mr. Charles W. Stayer, subject, "Life, or Enchantment and Reality." The gentleman's ability and reputation as a lecturer are so well known by the Salt Lake public, that we may expect a large attendance. The subject furnishes a fine field for both information and amusement. Besides drawing from the realm of enchantment, the speaker will draw out some of the realities of life, and we understand he will give his views on labor, on editors, clocks and lawyers, and on women, marriage and office-holding. The lecture will commence at half-past seven o'clock. The lecture chair, under the leadership of Professor John Daynes, as usual, will be in attendance. The public are invited. Admission free.

Boards of Trade.—Hon. Moses

Wheeler called upon us to-day, and we took occasion to mention his labors in the organization of boards of trade in the southern States.

We published a short time since an account of the organization in Fresno, together with the names of the officers. On the 6th inst. an organization in San Jose was effected, with 70 members and the following board of directors: Geo. Teasdale, W. F. Kelley, John Vick, Charles Foster, Edwin Harley, Elmer Taylor and J. M. Hawks, who subsequently elected the following officers: Geo. Teasdale, president; Charles Foster, vice-president; Joel Grover, business manager; Herbert Taylor, secretary; Edwin Harley, treasurer.

On the 6th inst. eighty-one members were enrolled and the following directors elected for the San Jose County board of trade: Canine, Reelson, Henry Beal, Luther, Kettle, Andrew Madson, James A. Alfred, Phillip Hurd, T. W. Irons, Anthony Christiansen and C. A. Madson. No further organization had been made in San Jose when Bro. Thatcher left.

An excellent feeling prevails among the people, and there is a disposition to work for the good of the whole community. Work is being pushed forward on the Manhattan Temple, there being one hundred men and twenty-eight teams constantly employed. The work of leveling, preparatory to building the foundation, is about concluded.
