New Tabernacle.—The progress being made towards completing the new Tabernacle is quite satisfactory. Work on the outside has been suspended for the winter. Twenty-five men are now steadily at work making pinnacles to cap the stone plasters, after which the joints and floors will be immediately laid. Trenches for the heating pipes are also being made. Brother Henry Grew, the superintendent, says that if material and other necessary help is forthcoming, the house can be finished early next summer. Between fifty and sixty thousand feet of lumber still required to complete the building. The means necessary to pay for this material is expected from the Saints of this State, whose promptitude already has been a source of encouragement to the building committee.

Gates' Opera.—On Monday and Tuesday the 29th and 30th, English Comic Opera Company will give performances in the Tabernacle in this city. Mr. C. S. Ammen, the business manager of the company came into the city yesterday and called at our office to-day. The company perform at Sacramento to-day, and next week at Virginia City. The operas presented here, the Little Duke and The Bella of Corneville, are two new pieces, and wherever presented have been received with great applause. The company intended to have been in San Francisco and the west for six weeks only, instead of which their engagements have been extended to five months, 180 consecutive performances being given in the Bush Street Theatre, San Francisco. After two performances here they proceed to Denver and from there to Chicago.

Pleasant Anniversary.—Last evening was the third anniversary of the organization of the Y. M. M. L. A. of the 15th Ward, and to celebrate the event, a really pleasant entertainment was provided.
