In the recount yesterday Rolapp ade a number of gains during the con, but the districts counted in he afternoon were more in favor of lowell. There are several elements of uncertainty which make it difficult to prepare an accurate table, but the at-terneys for Howell admit a net loss of 2 votes for their client in the 42 dis-tricts which have been recounted. The original votes in these 42 dis-tricts was: For Howell, 3,962; for Relarp, 3,596; a majority of 266 for Howell. The recount in the same 42 districts is: Howell, 3,666; Rolapp,3,435, 42 a cut down of 35 in Howell's majority.

\$15,000 DAMAGE SUIT.

An action has been filed in the Sec-end district court by G. L.
