Newhouse Mines May Add Big Acreage to Present Territory-Talk Of Combinations Renewed.

Utah is apparently on the eve of some great consolidations in mining properties and in spite of denials on one side and the silence of the other, the latter seems to be working out the saying "still waters run deep." T

saying "still waters run deep." The proposed consolidations that are now under way, are said to be the Utal Copper company and the Boston Consolidation, and the consolidation of the Black Bird group and the Comet properties in Beaver county, with the New house Mines & Smelters, it is understood that the latter is contemplated in the reorganization plan of the New house Mines & Smelters as the Southers Utah Mines & Smelters company.

Samuel Newhouse admits that the combining of the latter properties has been talked of, but as to anything further he is unwilling to talk. The Comet group is the property of the Newada-Utah Mines & Smelters Corporation. The property has never been worked to any extent under the present company and it is believed that the company is willing to dispose of its holdings. The Black Bird group is part of the holdings of the Black Bird Copper-Gold Mining company, limited, which is controlled by John E. DuBois and associates of Du Bois, Pa. This property consists of approximately 106 claims and the ore found on it is copper and lead. There is a hoist on the New Year shaft which has been sunk to the 300-foot level. Another shaft with a depth of 275 feet is also on the property. The consolidation would make one of the greatest properties in the state. The consolidation would make or of the greatest properties in the state The Newhouse company owns the townsite and the water and also has

townsite and the water and also has the railroad running to it.

To persons who have looked over the situation carefully, it seems almost inevitable that Utah Copper and Boston Consolidated will some day be one property D. C. Jackling, manager of the Utah Copper, has several times asserted that there was no truth to the story, but from other sources it is understood that the plans have been discussed by the stockholders of both companies.

"A company may have a great deal of ore blocked out," declared a local engineer recently, "but they cannot always get it out. That is what the Utah Copper will some day run up against, I fear. When the ore has been removed to the canyon level how is it going to be removed by steam shovels and railroads except for a few feet. I believe that sooner or later, a tunnel will have to be used and the caving system adopted."

The Consolidation of the two properties would make the greatest copperproducing company in the world.

An eastern paper recently in speaking of the consolidation declared that the exchange would probably be on the basis of one share of Utah Copper stock to three shares of Boston Consolidated. This is not looked upon in Utah

TRADING IS MORE GENERAL.

LETTER ON UTAH COPPER. Brokerage Firm Has Some Interest-

ing Figures on Condition. In a very interesting special letter on Utah Copper, which has just been issued by Trippe, Thompson & Co., the conditions at this property are clearly outlined. It is stated that during the past year the developed and partially developed area has been increased by eight acres, making a total of 80 acres. There was at the end of the year in the fully developed, partially developed and reasonably assured reserves, a tonnage of 80,000,000 tons, of which 65,-000,0000 average 2 per cent copper and 15,000,000 run approximately 1.5 per cent copper. In addition to the above it is estimated that there are 40,000,000 tons of 1.5 per cent copper ore indicated by

By figuring the cost of production on the higher grade ore at 8 cents a pound and 10 cents for the lower grade, it will be seen that the total net value of the ore reserves, when the capping has been removed, will amount to \$188,700,000. removed, will amount to \$188,700,000.

The company is operating two concentrators, the Copperton and Garfield plants, the former treating 800 tons of ore daily and the latter 6,000 tons, a combined production of 6,800 tons a day, about one-fifth of which assaying 2 per cent copper, is being taken from the underground stopes and the remainder, assaying 1.75 per cent copper coming from pits by steam shovel. coming from pits by steam shovel. In all probability additional units will be added to the mill within the next year and a half, or before the new porphry deposits now being developed will be producing, which should place the property on an annual production basis of from \$0,000,000 to 100. 000,000 pounds. At the present time the property is producing at the rate of approximately 5,000,000 pounds a month with the mill running at capacity.
