GEO. Q. CANNON NOMINATED.

Ten Republicans and Three Democrats Vote
for Him Today.

MORE EXPECTED TO FOLLOW.

A Day of Excitement and Speech-making—Members Talk of
Treason—Another Session Will be
Held Tonight.

The latest sensation in the joint session was the nomination of Geo. Q. Cannon for the office of United States senator. Two of the McGraw resolutions made speeches and were voted for Mr. Cannon. Both ten Republicans followed their lead, giving the new candidate a total of thirteen. A good deal of excitement prevailed, and many speeches were made.

THE BALLOT.

The 14th ballot was as follows:

F. J. Cannon, F. King, 13; McNamee, 23; Futherford, S. Gee, Q. Cannon, 13.

For F. J. Cannon—Senators Knobell and Shurtliff; Representatives Bramwell, H. Davis, Evans, Johnson, Law, Smith and Taylor, 8.

For King—Senators Bonham, Neely, McNamee and M. P. Felt; Representatives Jacob, Cook, Plate, Greenwood, Jackson, Leaphart, Larson, Rawlins and Wheeler, 11.

For Futherford—Senators Chambers, Evans, Poetry, Pound, and Representatives Bonham, Harris, C. J. Miller, Murdoch, Neely, P. D. Quinn, Redd, Smith and Woods, 12.

The joint session convened at noon. As soon as the balloting began and Senator Bonham's name was called, he was seen to speak.

SENATOR BONHAM'S SPEECH.

A speech was delivered which caused much interest, that is, whether the free state Democrats are to be influenced by Republicans into voting for gold standard. I hope my political views will be upheld, but they are not. I have been told that the Republicans are to be influenced by the Democrats before the election comes. If that is the case, we will meet the same question in our next session, and I hope to call to question the church of which I am a member in which I stand, and which I have always stood, and the people of my life. I know the men who have stood as leaders of the people throughout the country, and I cannot help but regret the result I see coming if the Democrats vote through subversive influence, the same as the Senate did.

The way the Mormons vote is going to be a great concern to me. I hope the Republicans will decide that the vote of the Mormons would decide the election of the President. I hope the people of the country know they have the most. They are trying to get the most. They are in Utah in a majority, and I hope the surrounding states are in a minority. But the like Confederates are now westward; we are now returning to our political friends. And the great question is, Will we as Democrats feel it is our duty to take up the cause of the party? We cannot do it. This is the question whether the people I am now on do the people of the great west will say we are unworthy of the franchises. I have some efforts to disarrange my people.

What will be the option of Utah and of the dominant Church? I am sure the people of the country will be for a gold-standard Republic. This nation is the pride and glory of the world. More than any other, we have all civil and religious rights and liberties. I desire to make my conversion before the election. I am a gold-standard Republican. I am converted by the Democrats. I now wash my hands of the H. A. W. McGraw. (Applause.)

BUTTERFLY FOR SILVER.

Senator Shurtliff said: I cast my vote for a man who has done as much as any man in Utah for the last four years—Geo. Q. Cannon.

Representative Bonham—I did not vote.

Shurtliff: I believe that I did not vote on the same spot or place of the floor occupied by Representative Law, when he sprang his nomination. But the vote was not pre-meditated. I would have preferred to be on the right hand of the chair, and the right of the speaker, and the right of the gavel on the left. I have been placed between the Republicans and the Democrats.

Representative Cannon: I am crowded back here. The mile is a pretty good animal. It is said, and I believe, that the author of the cause of the Church to which he belongs, if he did—but—
