LARGE ARBIVALS AT NEW YORK-THEIR FAMILIES AND HABITS.

The steamer Minnesota, which arrived yesterday, brought 1,100 passengers, among whom were 531 Mormons. The latter landed to-day at half-past twelve o'clock, and presented a very motley group of young and old male and fe-male. They are chiefly from the man-utacturing districts of England and Wales. One is an Italian with a wife wates. One is an Italian with a wite and eight children, six of whom are fe-males, and the oldest is not sixteen, years of age. It would scarcely be fair to criticise the appearance of the men, after coming from on board a steamer, but as a general thing they did not look as if they would add much bone and sinew to the faithful in Utah. A great many were very old men and women, but quite a number of pretty girls-sev-eral of whom had no male protectorswere among them.

Our reporter got into conversation with a very intelligent man from Manwith a very intelligent man from Man-chester who had only his wife and one staughter with him. He stated that another daughter had been married some time ago in England, but as work began to get slack it was agreed between her husband and herself that one of them should go to Utah. The husband was unwilling to go first, because he was afraid to leave his wife unprovided for behind him.
