One of the most daring burglarles that has been committed in Salt Lake for many years, occurred some time last night at the home of Capt. Chas. E. Williams, of the Salt Lake fire depart-

Last night, while Mrs. Williams and the rest night, while Mrs. Williams and the rest of the family were sleeping, a bold bur-glar entered the place, and ransacked all the rooms in search of valuables. So quiet was he in his work, that he opened a trunk at the side of the bed where Mrs. Williams was asseep, and emptied the contents on the floor. Irrigate 12,000 Acres.
