LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Elks will initiate five new members into the order on Wednesday night.

Edward H. Green, formerly Salt Lake City passenger agent of the Union Pacific, is dead at Kansas City.

The Scottish Rite Masons are conferring degrees up to the 18th today, including the Rose Croix degree.

County Atty. P. C. Christensen went to Provo today to attend the county attorneys' convention which meets there.

The office of collector of internal revenue will be removed from the city and county building next Tuesday to the new federal building.

Edward F. Hanson and Ida E. Phillips, both of Union, were married in the county clerk's office yesterday by Deputy Clerk David A. Smith.

Editor J. E. Deffenbach of the American Lumberman at Chicago has written the Salt Lake Commercial club an enthusiastic letter in approval of the scheme to "See America First."

The ladies of the Unitarian society will give an art tea at 6 p. m. today, when a collection of water colors painted by Miss Amelia Watson of Boston will be placed there on exhibition.

The funeral of Miss Catherine Biggar, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Biggar, who died Sunday of pneumonia, was held today from the residence of her parents, 705 First street, with private interment.

The delayed furniture for the new postoffice has finally appeared, and is being installed. As the final consignment is due here next Friday, the postoffice officials expect to be able to make the move on the 24th inst.

State Supt. of Schools Nelson is in receipt of word from Boxelder county to the effect that two teachers are needed in the schools of that county. One of the teachers is needed in the Washburn Indian school and the other in another district of the county.

The county commissioners yesterday afternoon opened the bids for the publication of the delinquent tax list and awarded the contract to the Telegram upon its bid of 11-17 cents per name and description. The "News" was the next lowest bidder, its bid being 13-10 cents per name and description.

The third grade pupils of the Grant and Union schools yesterday afternoon presented Primary Supt. Miss Rosalie Pollock with some bread and butter they had made in connection with the study of "Home Geography." The samples were very good and were highly appreciated by Miss Pollock.

EPIDEMIC OF TYPHOID.

Strange Condition of Affairs Reported in Sevier County.

A hard state of hygienic affairs is reported down in Sevier. The inspector from the state board of health in this city went down there Saturday, in response to reports emanating from there about typhoid, and found 12 cases at Elmore, and as many more at Moroni, both little places. The cause of the trouble at Elmore was ascribed to the water in a neighboring reservoir, and the inspector brought back a bottle of the fluid with him for analysis. It is a suspicious looking liquid, and full of particles of some kind so that the water is translucent rather than transparent. At Moroni the inspector found three girls sick with the fever all in one room, and being waited on by their mother.

COMPANY GETS WATER RIGHTS.

Important Decision Handed Down By Judge Marshall in the Federal Court.

TINTIC PEOPLE THE WINNERS.

Flow Comes From the Yampa Mine And Empties Into the Bingham Canyon Creek.

Judge Marshall has handed down a decision in the circuit court, giving to the Tintic Mining and Development company important water rights in Bingham canyon, and declaring that in the town of Bingham has no rights to water in the canyon over which there has been a dispute.

The flow in question comes from a tunnel at the Yampa mine, which empties its flow into Carr's Fork of Bingham canyon creek. Farther down the company takes out the water for use at its smelter, and it is held by Judge Marshall that the company has the right to take out as much water as it contributes to the stream, less evaporation and seepage, and that the town of Bingham has no water rights in the flow from the tunnel. No costs are allowed against the defendant, in favor of the plaintiff.

WANTS MOTION SET ASIDE.

Everard Brierer Says It is a Sham, Impermanent and Immateral.

A motion has been filed in the district court by Everard Brierer, Jr., asking that the motion of P. Jenk Shaffer, to set aside the decree of divorce granted Mr. Brierer, be stricken from the files on the grounds that it is sham, impermanent, irrelevant and immaterial; also on the grounds that Mr. Shaffer is not a party to the suit or to the record on the cause and has no authority, right or interest in the matter which would entitle him to be heard.

Shaffer, who is a nephew of the former Mrs. Brierer, who is now deceased, filed a motion asking that the decree of divorce granted Brierer be set aside in so far as it affects the property interests of the parties. In support of his motion he alleged a number of sensational matters and claimed that the divorce was secured by fraud and misrepresentation on the part of Brierer. The motion in the case will be heard by Judge Morse next Saturday.

TO DETERMINE FLOW.

A trip to Mill Creek was made today by Judge Morse, Engineer A. F. Sumner, and the litigants and attorneys in the case of James Young vs. Daniel Lunin et al., which has been on trial for more than a week, past. The action was brought for an apportionment of the waters of Mill creek among the various users according to their respective interests and the trip to the creek today was made for the purpose of determining the flow of the creek.

SUIT TO COLLECT.

The case of William Pattison against Patrick Peeney and Mary M. Condon has been transferred from Summit county to this county. Pattison is attempting to collect a judgment of \$20,000 rendered in his favor against Peeney on March 31, 1903, and he alleges that Peeney has transferred certain real estate and mining stocks to his daughter, Mrs. Condon, in order to defeat the collection of the judgment.

COURT NOTES.

Two libel suits filed in the district court against the same defendants have been transferred to the federal court. The plaintiffs are H. B. Clawson and M. C. Van Orden et al. It is alleged that defendants issued a circular using libelous language against the plaintiffs.
