

ANNEXATION OF HERZEGOVINA

Russia Insists Question Must be Submitted to Conference of Berlin Treaty Signatories.

SERBIA READY TO CONCUR.

If Great Britain, Russia and France Are Prepared to Notify Her Affair is Closed.

St. Petersburg, March 17.—The Austro-Hungarian ambassador to Russia has received from Foreign Minister Delyukin the reply of Russia to the notification of the dual monarchy of the signing of the Austro-Turkish protocol regarding the annexation by Austria-Hungary of the provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina. M. Tsvetkov insists that this direct understanding does not exclude the necessity of submitting the question of annexation of those provinces to a conference of the signatory powers of the Berlin treaty, and he says that Russia is now prepared to negotiate with Austria-Hungary and the other powers regarding the summoning of a conference to consider this and other questions.

Public opinion here is considerably excited over the situation between Austria-Hungary and Serbia and the possibility of war as an outcome, but it is believed in well informed circles that a solution of the crisis will be found. A local paper today publishes an inspired article, saying there is reason to

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believe that Great Britain and France will take active measures to block Austrian aggression.

SERBIA'S ATTITUDE.

London, March 18.—A dispatch from Belgrade says that if Great Britain, Russia and France are prepared to notify Serbia that they consider the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina a closed affair and no longer a concern of Serbia, Serbia is ready to concur in this and to take rigorous precautions she would consent to diminish the 2,000,000 soldiers called up for training, always provided that Europe guarantees the country against attack.

ANXIETY IN PARIS.

Paris, March 17.—The Balkan situation is creating the greatest anxiety here. According to latest information from Austria-Hungary, with the support of Germany, has fully resolved to send an expedition into Serbia unless this country changes her present attitude. M. Nelldorf, the Russian ambassador, and Foreign Minister Pinchon were in conference this afternoon.

MONTENEGRO ANGRY.

Cetinje, Montenegro, March 17.—For the last several hours carried out by Austrian warships anchored off Spizza in Herzegovina are growing very exasperating to the Montenegrins in that vicinity, and the authorities here had to take rigorous precautions to prevent reprisals on the Austrians. Spizza is near Montenegro's frontier.

BAD BARGAIN FOR THE PHILIPPINES

Payne Bill Considered Unfair for Islands Because of Limitations on Sugar.

MINING MEN WILL FIGHT.

Call Issued for Meeting of Lead Producers in This Month.

Manila, March 18.—The proposals embodied in the Payne bill for the revision of the tariff have been unfavorably received here because of the limitations placed on sugar and tobacco. It is generally felt if there is to be an unrestricted admission of American products to the Philippines it is only fair to admit freely Filipino products to America.

A prominent merchant here expressed the general attitude when he said: "The proposed arrangement is unequal and unfair. It is a bad bargain for the Philippines. There is no danger of the islands producing enough sugar and tobacco to injure American planters for the natural increase in consumption there would easily and quickly absorb any increase here. Accurate figures absolutely demonstrate this. The inevitable effect of the passage of this bill will be to discourage and retard development already retarded many years by the failure of Congress to do justice to these islands. We appeal to the sense of justice of the American people to make a fair and equitable arrangement and to right the old injustice."

It is expected that the commercial bodies of the islands will meet and cable protest against the proposals in the Payne bill which are considered objectionable here.

MINING MEN WILL FIGHT.

Denver, March 18.—Following the information that the new tariff bill provides for a reduction of the rate on lead contents of ores from 1 1/2 to 1 cent per pound comes the announcement of the determination of western mining men to fight this reduction which they declare will have the effect of closing practically all the low-grade independent lead-producing mines in the United States.

To this end, Secy. J. P. Callbreath of the American Mining Congress today issues a call for a meeting of operators of lead producers to be held in Salt Lake City, March 22. It is expected that Idaho, Utah and Colorado will be largely represented. Mr. Callbreath favors a vigorous campaign against this feature of the new tariff bill and will seek to have headquarters established at Washington and a good delegation of interested men there to urge Congress to defeat the proposed reduction on lead ores. To this end he will leave Denver the latter part of this week for an extended trip through the west.

The people of Colorado alone will lose \$400,000 annually, according to Callbreath. "If the duty is reduced to 1 cent a pound. Not only that, but thousands of men will be thrown out of employment in every corner of the state. The value of many millions of dollars will stand idle."

ENGLAND INTERESTED.

London, March 17.—The question of tariff revision has an unusual interest for the British public. The realization that there must be an ever-increasing expenditure of money on the budget difficulties, already brought about by Liberal social reforms, makes the overburdened taxpayer look for a direct relief for his pocket. The situation is one calculated to turn the waverers into the tariff reform camp.

Hence, the American tariff bill and its fate in Congress will be watched with keen interest in certain circles here. There is any slackening in the belief in America in the virtues of the protectionist system. The American correspondence of the day is full of articles refusing to believe that the senate will sanction any really effective reduction in duties.

The point out that there have been four revisions of the tariff since the civil war, but that none has resulted in materially reducing duties.

The most interesting points of the bill for the British public are the proposed application of an extra duty on tea, which will severely affect the British, and the patent clause, which is regarded as a retaliation for a tariff promulgated by David Lloyd George. The reduction of steel duties is expected to benefit the British trade.

The bill is much more than a free admission of works of art, which is calculated to act as a further incentive to American collectors in denuding Europe of its art treasures. On the whole, however, the bill is regarded as doing little to assist English trade and is likely to help the protectionist party here in its campaign, which is growing more and more prominent.

LIPTON EXHIBITED.

New York, March 18.—Sir Thomas Lipton's representative in New York W. W. Melville, is considerably incensed over the recommendations in the tariff bill submitted to Congress yesterday placing a tax of eight cents a pound on tea imports from producing countries and home consumption from non-producing countries. "Tea has become a necessity," Mr. Melville says, "and had ceased to be a luxury." If the tariff should be imposed as proposed, he thinks that the tea to the consumer will advance at least ten cents a pound. As a result he predicts that cheaper tea will be used and that the consumption will be greatly decreased.

Tea importers generally declare that the new schedule will not stand. The National Coffee and Tea association will take immediate steps to fight the proposal and their main argument will be that the burden will fall on the consumer rather than on the dealer. The market on all grades of tea advanced from two to three cents a pound yesterday.

WORKS OF ART.

New York, March 17.—Under the new provision of the proposed tariff which permits the importation of paintings and works of art more than twenty years old duty free, art treasures valued at between twenty and thirty millions likely soon will grace the private and public galleries in the United States.

Discussion of the effect of the new tariff on works of art among artists and collectors today brought out the fact that the art possessions abroad of J. P. Morgan are worth nearly six million dollars. It is well known that Mr. Morgan is one of the most enthusiastic of the trustees of the Metropolitan museum of art and that the removal of the duty upon such art treasures in London will now permit their transportation to New York.

Among the canvases owned by Mr. Morgan abroad are Raphael's "Madonna of St. Anthony of Padua" upon which a value of \$500,000 is placed; Rubens' "Portrait of the Grand Duke," worth \$125,000, and the famous Gainsborough

CALIFORNIA OIL INDUSTRY.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 18.—In the interest of the oil producers of this section, the chamber of commerce yesterday authorized the following telegram sent to Senator Flint: "We earnestly urge that the present duty on petroleum and its products be retained in the new tariff bill. Its elimination would be a severe blow to the oil industry of California by putting Mexican petroleum free of duty, while that country exacts a heavy customs duty on petroleum imports from the United States."

TWO VIEWS.

Chicago, March 18.—The new tariff bill is welcomed as a blessing and also as a menace in various industrial circles of Chicago. Eugene Buffington, president Illinois Steel company, sees a blight for the steel industry if the measure is enacted with its contemplated provisions. Harry Sola says that the shoe industry will flourish like a bay tree if bides are put on the free list.

The proposed reduction of tariff duties on lumber will not have any material effect on prices according to local dealers. Wool dealers were not sanguine as to consumers getting any benefits from the scheduled changes in wool duties and wholesalers were equally doubtful as to whether the measure, as now formulated, would increase the revenue.

ANTI-GAMBLING BILL.

Nevada Assembly Considers in Senate Amendments.

Carson City, Nev., March 17.—By a vote of 41 to 5 the Nevada assembly today concurred in the amendments to the anti-gambling bill, proposed and adopted by the senate. The legislature adjourns tomorrow and the governor has inferentially intimated that he will sign the bill. The new law, in made effective Oct. 1, 1910, immediately preceding a state election, at which it may be voted on through referendum. Bridge whist, poker and all banking games are prohibited under penalty for misdemeanor, punishable in justice court by six months in jail or \$500 fine. The result is deemed a doubtful victory by the opponents of gambling. Politically it is regarded as a Republican coup in the interests of Senator George S. Nixon's candidacy two years hence to succeed himself.

THREE MEN KILLED IN POWDER PLANT EXPLOSION

Wallace, Idaho, March 17.—Three men were killed in the explosion of the plant of the Coeur d'Alene powder works this afternoon. The dead: R. J. Stahberg, foreman; Pete Rico; Alvin Nelson.

All the dead were residents of Wallace and employees of the powder works. Five frame structures, together with the concentrator of the Coeur d'Alene Concentrating company, were wrecked. Four of the powder company's buildings being seriously leveled.

Friction on a copper screen in the mixing room during the process of the manufacture of powder, is believed to have been the cause of the disaster. In this room were stored more than 1,000 pounds of nitro-glycerine. This exploded, together with five tons of giant powder stores in nearby structures. The explosion caused a panic in Wallace.

HE DIED GAME.

Such is Epitaph to be Placed on Monument to John Gillard.

Charlottesville, Va., March 17.—No further investigation into the tragedy at "Merry Mills," resulting in the death of John Gillard, an Englishman, is contemplated by the authorities. The coroner's verdict exonerates John Armstrong Chaloner, who was suffering with illness in defense of the latter's wife, when the fatal shot was accidentally fired. Chaloner has given instructions that the blood spots which mark the scene of the tragedy in his library be preserved as a memento. He has arranged to care for Gillard's family until he can send them back to England. He has bought a piece of ground which he has dedicated to Gillard, and he will erect a handsome monument on which he will have inscribed: "John Gillard, March 15, 1909. He died game."
