PRICE OF GOLD.

Correspondence from the U. S. Mint, dated April 27, 1872, says that the price of gold is as follows:

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Meeting to-morrow evening at the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms at 7 o'clock. Meetings also at the other ward meeting houses at or near that hour.

THEATRE.—This evening, Miss Adams, Carrie Carter, Mrs. A. Chas. and Mrs. M. Graham, Thorne, Menden and Dunne and others will appear in the lively comedy of "Married Life." After which the farce of "Horatio Thomas Sparkins" will fill the house with cackling peals and reverberations.

On Monday, the talented and popular actress, Mrs. F. M. Bates, assisted by Mr. Bates and the local company, will appear and delight the theatre-going public with some masterly impersonations.

EXCURSION.—We understand Mr. Francis Platt and some others are getting up an excursion party to California. The party will start, we believe, some time during next month.

TO ATTEND TO THEIR OWN AFFAIRS.—The right of ecclesiastical organizations to manage their internal affairs by tribunals of their own creation, was distinctly affirmed by a decision of the United States Supreme Court on this subject recently and finally, and settles it, as will be generally admitted, in perfect accord with the spirit of our institutions. *Chicago Times, April 26.*

THAT ROBBERY.—The examination of C. Marion and John Dowd, charged with robbing Nellie Hutchinson, of a watch, chain and bracelet, came off yesterday afternoon. The evidence went to show that Marion visited the woman's residence on Wednesday afternoon, in company with two other men, who were introduced as General and Colonel somebody from San Francisco and who told him that they came to Utah to invest capital in the Mormon mine. After they left Nellie entered her jewelry and all the other things, and Marion and the other men came back and made complaint to the police authorities accordingly. Marion, hearing that the officers were after him, subsequently called upon the woman and told her that if she persisted in the charge made against him she would not get her property and would have all her trouble for nothing; that he had the property, but that she could not prove anything against him. He proffered to restore the jewelry provided she withdrew the charge. Afterwards Dowd called and stated that he had the articles and made a similar proposition, but stated he could not put the watch, chain and bracelet on her, where she could find them so that she could not swear that he gave them to her. The articles were subsequently found in the coat closet. The two women were bound over, by Justice Clinton, in \$2,000 each, to appear at the District Court, and in default were placed in the City Jail.

H. G. in the New York Tribune, is represented as speaking of "inconceivable mendacity," and saying that "there is not a shadow of excuse for this audacious, measureless lying." Wonder if the bland philosopher was referring to some one of the Salt Lake dispatch senders!

NO ROBBERY.—The decision of the Supreme Court of the United States yesterday, overruling the prosecution of the Mormons for their polygamous practices, will occasion no regret. The proceedings were ill advised, and offered no hope of terminating the existence of polygamy in Utah. If the decision is followed up, as it is estimated that it will be, by the removal of Chief Justice McKean, or that territory, it will secure another desirable result, for it is not a matter of any doubt that he is a mischievous demagogue. *Chicago Times, April 26.*

Graham, E. B. Menden, W. T. Harris, A. Thorne, and H. H. Menden, from the residence of Mr. Henry Menden to St. Mark's Church, followed by J. T. Chas. Esq., ex-manager of the theatre, (H. B. Clawson, Esq., manager, being unavoidably absent owing to sickness), members of the Dramatic Association of this city, other intimate acquaintances, and many friends. The services were conducted by Rev. Father and Rev. Mr. Kirby. The remains were then conveyed to and interred in the Episcopal cemetery, numerous carriages in all with friends accompanying them to the grave. The deceased was universally esteemed where known, and well respected by every member of the dramatic corps of this city, for her purity of character and her unvarying gentleness and ladylike deportment. She was a patient and devoted mother.

that he was badly hurt by accident. The telegram was from Salt Lake, a station on the U.P.R. about 230 miles from Ogden, that Frank M. Brown, a brakeman on the U.P.R. and oldest son of Alderman F. A. Brown, of this city, was accidentally killed at that place yesterday. The particulars given are very meagre, but it is supposed that while the freight train going east was backing up to the station, Frank missed his footing and fell between two cars.
